1. 1813 Napoleonic War era Prussian Iron Cross 2nd Class, 'straight stem' type. 41mm x 41mm frame, magnetic core, age worn, with much rubbing to lower frame ribbing, with a rather fragile original ribbon. A fine surviving example of this rare award. Est: \$1500 to \$2000

2. C. 1870 Franco-Prussian War era 9ct gold chain locket. An unmarked (tests for 9ct) locket, with iron cross, wreath and W 1870 enamel hand engraved face, with pull out bevelled base, with transparent face for inserting a photograph. Retains chain hanger and measures 30mm x 24mm x 5mm. Est: \$80 to \$140

3. 19th Century campaign Prussian/German 2 place medal group. 1866 Königgrätz Commemorative Cross, 1870 Franco-Prussian War Medal, with inscription to rim and Kingdom of Saxony sharp shooter's badge, affixed to front of ribbon mount. Period mounted as displayed. Est: \$120 to \$160

WW1 German 5 place Red Cross medal group. 1914-18 Merit Cross for War Aid, 1914-18 Prussian Red Cross War Service Medal, 2nd Class, 1914-23 Prussian Red Cross Merit Decoration, with green wreath for war service, Kingdom of Japan Red Cross Service Medal (most likely an award for the Russo-Japanese War) and 1908 Heinrich Bernhard Freiherr and Elisabeth von Ohlendorff 50th Wedding Anniversary Medal. War Merit Cross 1914-1918 with swords, N.S.D.A.P. long service cross for 15 and 10 years, the former with perfect enamel and a very good amount of white frosting to the sun rays and cross arms. Mounted as worn with pin back attachment and dark blue cloth backing A rare set. Est: \$1000 to \$1400

14. WW2 German Army 3 place Return of Memel medal group. 1939 Iron Cross 2nd Class, 4 Year Service Medal, with eagle device to ribbon and 1939 Return of Memel Commemorative Medal. Mounted as worn with pin back attachment and black felt backing. Scarce. Est: \$400 to \$500

15. WW1 German Duchy of Brunswick War Merit Cross, 1st Class. 41mm wide convex cross, with burnished edges, pin backed, an exceptional example. Est: \$200 to \$300

16. WW1 German Grand Duchy of Oldenburg Friedrich-August Cross, 1st Class. 45mm convex wide cross, with burnished FA and crown on matt black enamel finish, pin backed. Est: \$150 to \$250

17. WW1 German Kingdom of Wurttemberg Wilhelm's Cross of Merit for Public Welfare 1915. Toned bronze, with mounted ribbon, as awarded. A scarce medal, with only 1950 awarded. Est: \$150 to \$200

18. WW1 Austro-Hungarian Decoration for Services to the Red Cross, 2nd Class with war decoration in Rothe case of issue. Enamel cross, flawless, mounted ribbon, with pin back to central ribbon bow. Cross is housed in the flawless Rothe of Vienna leatherette case. Est: \$150 to \$200

19. WW1 German widow's and mother's funeral badge. Die stamped, 2-piece black enamel badge with face showing 1914 Iron Cross, with funeral wreath border, pin backed and measures 22mm x 30mm. These were given to the widows and mothers of dead German soldiers, upon visitation of their graves during The First World War. Est: \$150 to \$200

20. Immediate post WW1 German Silesian Eagle Order 1st Class. Black finished eagle, with much rubbing to enamel, retaining toned frosted silver half moon and bandau, pin backed and showing use and wear. Est: \$180 to \$260

21. Immediate post WW1 German Honour Badge, 1st Class of the 3rd Marine Brigade Von Lowenfeld. 40mm wide convex brass badge, with fine details to face, with burnished highlights, pin backed and correctly stamped to rear centre for C. Kust of Berlin. Scarce. Est: \$300 to \$400

22. 1937 Waffen S.S. Shooting/Marksmanship Badge, 2nd Class. Die struck, silvered cupal, with SS runes to lower wreath section. 33.5mm, 5.2g. Ges. Gesch and SS marked to pin backed reverse. Good toned finish overall. A textbook example and rare. (Detlev Niemann' Price Guide Germany 1871-1945, 3rd edition, page 437). Est: \$700 to \$900

23. 1937 Waffen S.S. Shooting/Marksmanship Badge, Master Class. Die struck, silvered cupal, with 3 oakleaves and SS runes to lower wreath section. 33.5mm, 5.6g. Ges. Gesch and SS marked to pin backed reverse. Comes with a copy photo of SS man wearing such a badge. A textbook example and exceptionally rare. (Detlev Niemann' Price Guide Germany 1871-1945, 3rd edition, page 437). Est: \$2000 to \$2500

24. Pre WW2 German cased 1938 Czechoslovakia Occupation Medal (Sudetenland Medal) with Prague Castle Bar. Medal, with clasp, mounted ribbon, with pin backing having been removed, in gilt eagle embossed leatherette award case. Est: \$160 to \$220

25. WW2 cased German Cross in Gold by Otto Klein of Hanau, having been presented to Captain H. J. Williams, R.E.M.E. in 1945, whilst serving in Germany with the 227th Highland Brigade. A near mint example of the German Cross in Gold, 63mm wide frosted white starburst base, standard 4 rivets, maker stamp 134 in rounded cornered rectangle, with pin and catch. Dull grey overlay starburst, with finely gilded wreath, with the standard 1941 date mark, white frosted centre plate, with faultless enamel swastika to centre. The cross is housed in the white sateen and black felt lined leatherette case, with the typical gold band to upper lid. The total weight of the cross being 45.66g. Est: \$3000 to \$4000

The accompanying paperwork shows that this cross was consigned to Spink auctioneers in London in March 2009, along with other German awards by J P Warren, the son of Captain Williams. Paperwork relates to the story that this and the other awards were presented to the officer in Lubeck in May 1945, as a memento of the esteem of the local population, for help in restoring the local transportation system within the locality.

26. WW2 German Cross in Gold – Luftwaffe bullion type. Gilt metal wreath, with sewn bullion and cotton details to LW grey blue wool base, retaining all of the original dark grey backing, measuring 72mm wide. Est: \$600 to \$800

27. WW2 German, Bar to the Iron Cross 1st Class by C. E. Juncker, Berlin, in box of issue. Early war superior quality made piece, with magnificent silver frosting to entire piece. L/12 maker marked to underside of pin, with catch, with very light wear and handling. The carmine coloured box, with gilt LDO logo to centre top lid, scuffed to corners, with purple flocked felt to interior. A stunning example. Est: \$400 to \$500

28. WW2 German Iron Cross 1st Class by Wilhelm Deumer of Lüdenscheid, in case of issue. 44mm wide cross arms, excellent central magnetic iron core, with very good frosting to cross arms edges and frame. L/11 maker marked to underside of catch, with pin and reverse with excellent toned frosting. The case is in similar condition, with silver silhouette cross to top lid, making this a quality set overall. Est: \$500 to \$600

29. WW2 German Iron Cross 1st Class, in case of issue. 44mm wide cross arms, excellent central magnetic iron core, with very good frosting to cross arms edges and frame. Unmarked pin and reverse with excellent toned frosting. The case is in similar condition, with silver silhouette cross to top lid, overall a terrific piece. Est: \$400 to \$500

30. WW2 German Iron Cross 1st Class. EK1 44mm wide cross arms, magnetic core in very fine condition, coke bottle pin with catch, a fine piece, toned overall. Est: \$300 to \$400

31. WW2 German Iron Cross 2nd Class and D.R.L. Sports Badge in Bronze, with award documents to Obergefreiten Hans Schriever. The Iron Cross document being hand signed by General Wolfram Von Richthofen, the cousin of the famed 'Red Baron'.

1939 Iron Cross 2nd Class, 44mm wide frame with magnetic core, unmarked suspension ring. A fine condition cross with hole punched award document, dated 20th April 1941, in 'the field' to Obergefreiten Hans Schriever, boldly signed in grey ink by General Der Flieger Richthofen, whilst commander of the 8th Flying Corps. Centre fold, in overall fine condition. D.R.L. Sports Badge in Bronze (upgraded award), pin backed, by Wernstein, Jena, with original D.R.A. Sports award booklet, showing the bronze award, dated 20th October 1936. Document #60681 and shows a photo of Schriever in Hitler Youth uniform, giving a date of birth as 31st August 1916, with his locality as Glückstadt. Est: \$300 to \$400

Field Marshal Wolfram Karl Ludwig Moritz Hermann Freiherr von Richthofen (10 October 1895 – 12 July 1945) was a German World War I flying ace and flew with his famous cousin Manfred on his first mission, which was to be the final mission for Manfred, being shot down the same day. Wolfram served during WW2 and rose to the rank of Generalfeldmarschall in the Luftwaffe, taking part in just about every major operation of the war, dying of a brain tumour in Austria, 12th July 1945.

32. WW2 German Iron Cross 2nd Class to Gefreiten Wilken, 277th Grenadier Regiment, with award document signed by Generalleutnant Theodor Scherer. 1939 Iron Cross 2nd Class, 44mm wide frame with magnetic core, full length ribbon, the suspension ring stamped '24' (Arbeitsgemeinschaft der Hanauer Plakettenhersteller, Hanau am Main). A fine condition cross with hole punched award document for the campaign in the East, dated 4th September 1943, to Gefreiten Lübbo Wilken, of the 3rd Company of the 277th Grenadier Regiment, boldly signed in blue pencil by Scherer. Light folds, in overall fine condition, with copy photos and brief biography of the General. Est: \$300 to \$400

General Theodor Scherer (1889 - 1951) was a famous German divisional commander who against all odds held off Russian attacks at Cholm for 107 days and was awarded the Knight's Cross with Oak Leaves. Scherer's outstanding feat of arms was one of Germany's most famous military achievements during WW2.

33. WW2 German Iron Cross 2nd Class to Unteroffizier Schuette, 540th Infantry Battalion, with award document signed by Generalmajor Gerhard Matzky. 1939 Iron Cross 2nd Class, 44mm wide frame with magnetic core, full length ribbon, the suspension ring stamped '13' (Gustav Brehmer of Markeneukirchen). A fine condition cross with hole punched award document, dated 9th February 1943, to Unteroffizier Schuette, of the 4th Company of the 540th Infantry Battalion, boldly signed in grey ink by Matzky. Centre fold, in overall fine condition, with copy photos and brief biography of the General. Est: \$300 to \$400

General Gerhard Matzky (1894 to 1983) was a highly decorated General der Infanterie in the Wehrmacht during World War 2 who commanded several corps. His battles and wars

include WW1, the Siege of Leningrad, the East Prussian Offensive and the Samland Offensive. He also received the Knight's Cross of the Iron Cross. He was captured by British troops in 1945 and was released in 1948.

34. WW2 German Iron Cross, Austrian Occupation and Russian Front medals, shooters and association badge (5). 1939 Iron Cross 2nd Class, 44mm wide frame, magnetic core, '25' stamped to suspension ring (Arbeitsgemeinschaft der Graveur, Hanau) with full award ribbons, Anschluss Commemorative Medal, Eastern Front Medal, these last two with good original ribbons, 1938 Tyrolean Marksmanship Badge in Bronze and Der Stahlhelm tinny badge. A good lot. Est: \$200 to \$300

35. WW2 German 'Schinkel' Iron Cross 2nd Class and Knight's Cross neck ribbon section. 'Schinkel' cross core is magnetic, 43mm wide frame, light wear, with typical split suspension loop hook, making this a Paul Meybeauer of Berlin made example. Comes with a short length of R.K. neck ribbon, with applied slits to either end for button wear on the tunic collar. Est: \$250 to \$350

36. WW2 German Iron Cross 2nd Class 'straight arm' type, with Waffen S.S. Leibstandarte Adolf Hitler unit cypher badge to ribbon. 44mm wide frame, magnetic, core, light wear, with worn gilt finished LAH unit shoulder board badge (27mm x 22mm) retaining one prong, on sewn, slightly soiled ribbon. Est: \$250 to \$350

37. WW2 German military award and service medals (4). Iron Cross 2nd Class, magnetic core, 44mm wide frame, #65 stamped to ring for Klein & Quenzer, Oberstein, WH 12-year medal, gilt finished, dull, 18 year cross, silver washed and police 8 year service medal. All with ribbons, the last 3 without eagle devices to ribbons. Est: \$200 to \$300

38. WW2 German Navy Kriegsmarine Minesweeper Badge .935 silver marked. An exceptional quality 1-piece silver variety, with silver wash finish to the entire badge including the wreath, 935 (silver) marked, hand shaped wide pin backed. WW2 German 40 Year and 25 Year Service Crosses in cases of issue (2). 40 Year example - Gilt finished wreath metal cross, with central enamel swastika in Deschler and Sohne, München maker marked red leatherette award case, with gilt embossed 40 in wreath to top lid. 25 Year example – frosted white finished wreath metal cross, with central enamel

swastika in Wächtler and Lange of Mittweida maker marked red leatherette award case, with silver embossed 25 in cogwheel to top lid. Both medals mounted, in overall exceptionally fine condition. Est: \$200 to \$300

53. Pre WW2 German enamel Nazi Party members badges (2). Enamel badges, RZM era, pre war quality. WW2 Soviet Union/Russia Order of the Red Banner #291668, attributed to Colonel Andrey Moiseyev, 5th Guards Army, who would also be awarded the Orders of Lenin, Alexander Nevsky, Suvorov, 3 Orders of the Red Banner and Patriotic War 1st Class by career's end. Order of the Red Banner, with clean and spotless enamel, original nickel

bracket and ribbon, Moscow Mint marked, numbered 291668 to heavily toned scalloped reverse. Awarded 28th May 1945. Est: \$400 to \$600

Citation: 'Comrade Moiseyev, in the battles against the German invaders, displayed courage, stamina and the ability to command units and the Regimental Headquarters in a difficult combat situation.

On 16 April 1945, when crossing the River Neisse, one of the [Units] to cross and seize the bridgehead for further offensive [operations] was the Regiments' 1st Battalion. All the preparations and the crossing arrangement were carried out by comrade Moiseyev; despite the strong enemy fire, comrade Moiseyev was all the time on the riverbank and continued his work. On the night of 15 to 16 April, under comrade Moiseyev's directions, the entire Battalion was transferred to the left bank of the River Neisse, where a bridgehead was captured by the 1st Rifle Battalion. for the development of a further offensive by all Units. For the entire period of the Combat operations, from the River Neisse to the River Elbe, comrade Moiseyev was always in the Companies, where he personally clarified the situation, immediately reported to the distance Command and he promptly executed the assigned tasks.

During the defence of the city of Geesverde, where one Battalion and the Regimental Headquarters were located, the enemy tried to break into the city with superior forces. Thanks to comrade Moiseyev's skilful leadership, the Headquarters and elements of the Regiment repulsed the enemy counterattacks; comrade Moiseyev, being in the Battalion, personally led the battle. In the battles to expand the bridgehead on the left bank of the River Elbe, on 1st and 2nd May 1945, the enemy, with superior forces in infantry and equipment, launched several counterattacks with the task of kicking our units out of the bridgehead. Comrade Moiseyev, acting with courage and determination, was all the time in the Combat Units of the Regiment, inspiring the personnel, organising Units for the counterattack of the enemy, and personally analysing the situation, which he reported to the distance Command. For the entire period the Regimental H.Q. has been working accurately, the documentation is drawn up accurately and in a timely manner'.

Comrade Moiseyev deserves the governmental award, the Order of the "Red Banner." Commander of the 173rd Guards "Częstochowa" Red Banner Rifle Regiment, Guards Major - Rogov.

Colonel Andrey Pavlovich Moiseyev who was born in 1909 in the village of Zhukovo, Buzdyakovsky District, Bashkir Autonomous SSR. He was a member of the Communist Party since 1938 and joined the Red Army in September 1931. During WW2 he won his first of three Order of the Red Banner, whilst serving with the 5th Guards Army (No. 51/H). As well as 173rd Guards Rifle Regiment, 58th Guards Rifle Division. In 1951 he was serving as Regimental Chief of Staff of the 1st Guards Rifle Corps.

69. WW2 Soviet Union/Russia Ushakov Medal #1836, attributed to Sailor Vokuyev Iyevlevich, for service against the German invaders, whilst aboard the land base 'Lviv', 2nd "Konstanza" Submarine Brigade of the Black Sea Fleet in December 1944.

Ushakov Medal, with clean and spotless ribbon, with chain hanger, original nickel bracket, the rear stamped 1836. Awarded 29th December 1944. Est: \$400 to \$600

Sailor Vokuyev Petr Iyevlevich was born in 1912 in Komi Republic, having been born as a serf/peasant. He saw service with the Red Navy in January 1942, being wounded on the 16th February 1942. His citation for the award: 'Comrade Vokuyev, machine gunner of the 4th Marine Battalion, 4th Guards Marine Brigade, participated in the battles in the Mozdokek direction. From the 9th to the 16th of September 1942, the 4th Battalion, after fighting, captured several settlements, but on the 16th was stopped by superior enemy forces. The main weight of the battle fell on the 4th Battalion because it was the vanguard. The enemy

threw dozens of tanks and infantry at the battalion. The Machine gun detachment, which Vokuev was part of, as the most courageous and hardened in previous battles unit, transferred to operate in the most critical areas of the battle. When armour-piercing bullets from Anti-tank Rifles knocked out tanks, Vokuev pointed at the hatches of burning tanks and with well-aimed machine-gun fire shot the Germans escaping from the tanks. When the enemy infantry appeared, Vokuev's machine gun forced them to turn back, every time destroying dozens of fascists. When the Germans discovered his hidden machine gun in the grass, threw a hurricane of fire at the machine gun point and seriously wounded comrade Vokuyev. The bandaged Vokuyev was lying right there in the grass, shooting from his gun because, in the midst of the battle, it was impossible to crawl to his machine gun crew from this far advanced position. Three of his four-men machine-gun crew were wounded and completely incapacitated. Seeing this, the machine gunner Vokuyev crawled back to the machine gun and continued to fire. On 16.09.1942, in the evening, he was wounded again in the right leg and at nightfall Vokuyev was evacuated to the Hospital № 3187. Upon recovery, he was appointed as a machine gunner at the "Lviv" line on 08.10.1942. He has been the commander of a DShK machine gun and knows perfectly the gun. Comrade Vokuyev showed his fearlessness and calmness in battle with a fascist aircraft while sailing on the front-line floating base "Lviv" in Gelendzhik'. I award the Medal "Ushakov", Commander of the 2nd "Konstanza" Submarine Brigade of the Black Sea Fleet, Vice Admiral Solovyev. 8th December 1944.

The straight cut sleeve cuffs each have a small, vertical, outside seam, slash with dual, each with 2 fit adjustment buttons, one dark brown the remainder dark grey, with inner economy silk lining. The tunic is lined with light grey/green silk, showing worn 'sheen' finish, being ink stamped Betr. Ra. 41/45/104/59/62. Twin internal map pockets, retaining fitting straps. Approx. size 38. Air Chief Marshal Sir William Alec Coryton KCB, KBE, MVO, DFC, RAF (16 February 1895 – 20 October 1981). He was considered by his peers as one of the RAF's most capable group commanders. During WW1 he was commissioned as an officer in the British Army's Rifle Brigade (Special Reserve), then transferred to the Royal Flying Corps as a Lieutenant in 1918. When the RFC became the Royal Air Force, he resigned his Army commission and became a Royal Air Force officer. From 1925 to 1928, he was Officer Commanding 16 Squadron based at Old Sarum. operating the Bristol F.2 Fighter in the tactical reconnaissance role. 25 April 1942 made AOC, No. 5 Group RAF Bomber Command. It has been claimed that the then Air Commodore Coryton was sacked by Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Harris for refusing to send a small force of Lancasters from his group on a sneak raid to Berlin in poor weather conditions.

In February 1943 Coryton moved to the Air Staff at the Air Ministry and was appointed Assistant Chief of the Air Staff (Operations) in 1944. On 25 August 1944 he became Commander, RAF Third Tactical Air Force. 4 December 1944 made Commander, RAF in Bengal & Burma. May 1945 Assistant Air Commander, Eastern Air Command. 27 February 1945 Air Marshal Commanding, HQ RAF Burma. Coryton retired from the RAF in 1951 but remained at the Ministry of Supply in a civilian capacity. He died on 20 October 1981 at Langton Matravers, Dorset.

Vice Admiral Wilder DuPuy Baker was born on July 22, 1890, in Topeka, Kansas. In 1910



Baker received an appointment to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland. Among his classmates were 12 future admirals. Baker graduated with Bachelor of Science degree in 1914 and was commissioned Ensign. He then served aboard USS Florida, USS Jason and USS North Carolina and took part in the operations in the Syrian waters. In 1915 Baker entered the submarine service and completed instruction aboard USS Fulton and subsequently assumed duty in connection with fitting out of the submarine USS F-1. Baker was transferred to submarine USS L-11 in October 1917 and embarked for European waters two months later. Baker participated in the submarine patrols in Irish Waters and was promoted to Lieutenant during his World War I service. He returned to the United States in February 1919 and post war assumed command of a number of

submarines, which he operated along the East Coast, performing experiments and developing submarine warfare tactics. Baker was detached from sea duty in May 1938 and appointed Professor of Naval Science and Tactics at Yale University.

In 1940 he returned to sea as Commander, Destroyer Squadron 31, which participated in the escort convoy duties in the Atlantic Ocean. One of the ships under his command was destroyer USS Reuben James, which was the first U.S. Navy ship sunk by hostile action. Baker served briefly as the Anti-Submarine Warfare officer under the Commander-in-Chief, Atlantic Fleet Admiral Royal E. Ingersoll in March 1942. He also held additional duty as Commander of Fleet's Anti-Submarine Unit. Later serving in Washington, Baker became involved in the development of operational research. He cooperated with the Anti-Submarine Warfare Operations Group from the Columbia University and after persuading by future Nobel Prize laureate, William Shockley, who successfully persuaded Baker to arrange for them to go on patrols with the antisubmarine forces so they could see for themselves what was taking place.

In December 1942, Baker was ordered to the South Pacific and assumed duty as Commanding Officer of the battleship, USS North Carolina. He led the ship during patrols near Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands and returned with ship to Hawaii in March 1943. While there, Baker was promoted to Rear Admiral on May 27, 1943. He was subsequently appointed Commander Cruiser Division ONE with additional duty as Commander, Task Force NINETY-FOUR (TF-94) and led his command during the Aleutian Islands campaign and later operated his forces under adverse weather conditions, conducting the first surface bombardment of the Japanese home islands and led the first offensive operations into the Sea of Okhotsk. For his service during those operations, Baker was decorated with the Navy Cross. Baker was appointed Commander, Cruiser Division 14 and remained in that capacity

until July of that year, when he assumed duty as Chief of Staff and Aide to Commander, Second Fast Carrier Task Force, Pacific Fleet under Vice Admiral John "Slew" McCain. While in this command, he participated in the operations at Palau Islands, the Philippines, and Ryukyu Islands and together with Captain "Jimmy" Thach, McCain's operations officer, he devised tactics for using picket destroyers with combat air patrols to defend against kamikaze attacks. He was present aboard battleship USS Missouri during the Japanese Surrender Ceremony in Tokyo Bay on September 2, 1945. For his service under Admiral McCain, Baker was decorated with Silver Star, Legion of Merit with Combat "V" and Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V". He retired in August 1952 after 42 years of active duty and died on November 10, 1975, aged 85, in San Diego, California.

Acting Sergeant Robert Roston was born in 1896 in Lancashire, England. A labourer by trade, he enlisted into the 9th Light Horse on 24/10/1914 in South Australia with the service No 13. He served as a signaller with the regiment rising to the rank of Acting Sergeant. Served at Gallipoli from May 1915 – Oct 1915, the 9th was fortunate to be the reserve regiment for the Brigade's disastrous attack on the Nek on 7 August, but subsequently suffered 50 per cent casualties attacking Hill 60 on 27 August. The handle carries the date 11 October 1915 which would have been the date he left Gallipoli. He was wounded in action during the 2nd Battle of Gaza (19/4/1917) receiving a gunshot wound to his leg. He returned to Australia with the regiment in June 1919 after suppressing the Egyptian revolt in March 1919.

Jonathan Mayhew Wainwright IV (August 23, 1883 – September 2, 1953). Wainwright commanded American and Filipino forces during the Japanese invasion of the Philippines, for which he received a Medal of Honor for his courageous leadership. In May 1942, on the island stronghold of Corregidor, lacking food, supplies and ammunition, in the interest of minimizing casualties Wainwright surrendered the remaining Allied forces on the Philippines. At the time of his capture, Wainwright was the highest-ranking American prisoner of war, he spent three years in Japanese prison camps, during which he suffered from malnutrition and mistreatment. In August 1945, he was rescued by the Red Army in Manchukuo. He carried out much good work with regards to refugee charity work during WW1 and was later the National Liberal Party (UK) Member of Parliament for Roxburgh and Selkirk from 1922 to 1923, Knighted in 1919, his son Sir James Henderson was in the diplomatic service where he had a distinguished career, with his 1953 coronation medal and certificate selling as a separate lot in this auction.

Colonel Robert Oswald Henderson, who was the commander of the 39th Battalion A.I.F., when in September 1918, he was sniped and killed, during the battalions last major engagement of the war. D.S.O. recommendation: 'East of Ypres, both during operations of the 4/ 5th and 12/ 13th Oct 1917, this officer stood out conspicuously on account of his absolute indifference to danger and of his leadership. On the 4th when he and his Battalion had reached their objective, he personally supervised the digging in and re-organisation. He then remained in the shell hole with his men - his cheerfulness and high spirits having a wonderful affect in keeping up their courage and spirits. On the 12th his Battalion was in Reserve but was quickly absorbed as reinforcements owing to very heavy casualties. The various units had become mixed up and many Officers had become casualties so that it needed vigorous action by a senior Officer on the spot to re-organise. This task was carried out admirably by Lt. Col Henderson inspite of the great difficulty due to marshy nature of the ground and to the heavy enemy shell fire and perfect hail of machine gun bullets which were enfilading the position. His example was a great incentive to all troops not only of his own but of other units'.

Lieutenant Colonel Robert Oswald Henderson was born on 26/7/1875 in Bendigo, Victoria. His father was the owner of the famous Beehive Stores. He was first commissioned as a Lieutenant with the 5th Infantry Battalion on 16/5/1899, transferring to the 8th Battalion A.I.R in 1903. Promoted to Captain in 1904 and Major in 1910 (in 1912 the 8th Battalion became the 67th Battalion). Owing to illness, he was not accepted into the A.I.F. until 1/5/1916, being posted as O.C. of the 38th Battalion. He departed Australia on 20/6/1916 bound for England and landed in France on 22/11/1916. Upon arrival, he was posted to the 39th Battalion as the Temporary Commanding Officer on 15/2/1917, being promoted to Lt. Colonel 15/5/1917. He remained in command of the battalion until his death. He was wounded in action on 29/3/1918 when struck in his left thumb with shrapnel from an anti-aircraft shell, whilst conducting his daily inspection of the battalion trenches and evacuated to England to return to the battalion on 12/6/1918. He was killed in action on 29/9/1918 near Gillemont Farm, when the supporting American attack broke down, he moved forward to investigate the situation and was killed instantly when sniped through the head. He was buried at St Emilie British Cemetery, Ronsoy, and later re-buried at Templeux-Le-Guerard British Cemetery.

The Bendigo Independent published the following on 7/10/1918:

'By the death in action, on September 29, of Lieut. Colonel Robert Oswald Henderson, D.S.O. commanding officer of the 39th (Ballarat) Battalion, and proprietor of the Beehive Stores. Bendigo, the Empire lost a fearless and gallant soldier, and the city a valued citizen. Official notification of his death was received on Saturday afternoon, by the Rev. J. Crookston; who conveyed the sad news to the relatives. Mrs. Henderson, senr. and Miss F. L. Henderson, are, at present on a visit to another daughter, Mrs. Shrimpton, of Sydney, and a message was forwarded to them. Sincere regret was expressed throughout the city when

the news was circulated, and at the Beehive and other institutions with which Lieut.-Colonel Henderson was prominently associated; flags were flown half- mast as a mark of respect'.

Captain Isaac Wyper Leiper was born on 26/1/1892 in Shotts, Lanarkshire, Scotland. He enlisted into the R.F.C. on 4/7/1917, being commissioned on 17/10/1917 as a 2nd Lieutenant, promoted to Flying Officer on 17/4/1918. Posted to the 103 Squadron (DH9's) as a pilot on 9/5/1918 and joined them in France. Promotion was quick and by the 16/8/1918 he was promoted to Acting Captain.

On 29/10/1918 he was part of a bombing mission which was attacked by a large force of German fighters, he was shot in the leg, severely fracturing his tibia and fibula, however he managed to make a landing in the American lines and was subsequently evacuated to England. His brother James was killed in action two days previous whilst serving with the Royal Artillery. He was awarded the DFC on 1/1/1919, the medal was presented to him in August 1921. Between the wars, he was working as a manager for the West Yorkshire Coal Sales Association. During WW2 he served with the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve from 30/10/1940 – 14/1/1946 as a Flying Control Officer with Fighter Command. He received a Mention in Despatches on 29/12/1942 for his services. Post war he was working for the Tripatite Coal Supplies in Essen, German when he received his M.B.E. for this specific work. London Gazette 31/12/1960. He died in 1966.

409. 'Indonesian Confrontation' M.B.E. and WW2 medal group to Warrant Officer Class 1 Robert Renwick Calvert, who served with the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers. The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire M.B.E. (Military), 2nd type breast badge; 1939 – 45 Star; Africa Star; Defence and War Medals (1939 – 45); British General Service Medal (4th type G.V.I.R), with 2 clasps MALAYA, CYPRUS, impressed named 22237051 S/SGT R.R. CALVERT. R.E.M.E.; British General Service Medal (E.II.R), with clasp ARABIAN PENINSULA, impressed named 22237051 W.O. CL. 1 R.R. CALVERT. REME. Court mounted as worn and comes with copy citation and London Gazette. Est: \$400 to \$500

'Warrant Officer I (Artificer Sergeant Major) Calvert has been the Warrant Officer in charge of 25 and 61 Squadrons Royal Corps of Transport Combined Light Aid Detachment for a period of two years which has been a period of intense transport activity in Singapore due to Indonesian confrontation against Malaysia. That 32 Regiment has been able to maintain a very high, and at peak operating periods 100% vehicle availability has been entirely due to the exceptional devotion, leadership and skill of this Warrant Officer. In January 1965, with the return to Singapore of some thirty 3-tonne vehicles from Labuan where they had been extremely heavily employed for the past eighteen months, there existed the unacceptable

risk of wholesale replacement which would have seriously jeopardised theatre stocks. Warrant Officer I Calvert, by his tremendous drive, leadership, skill and organisation, returned all but five of these vehicles to their Troops in a task worthy condition within ten days. This would normally have been quite outside the scope of a Light Aid Detachment, but due to Warrant Officer I Calvert's tremendous effort it was accomplished without outside assistance. Throughout 1965 he has maintained the same exemplary standards culminating in some two-hundred vehicles, which have covered three and a half million miles this year, being found 100% task worthy by Annual Inspection.'

Warrant Officer Class 1 Robert Renwick Calvert was born on 2/6/1920, his records have not been released yet so unfortunately little is known about his service. He died in June 1999 in West Yorkshire.

410. Order of Australia Medal awarded to Boris Trajkov, a 'colourful' character who was awarded the medal for Services to the Macedonian and other communities in 1991. He has subsequently faced various criminal charges including theft and drug matters, many of which have made national headlines as a result.

Order of Australia Medal, pantographed named to Boris TRAJKOV. RAM, mounted as awarded and comes with copies of various news articles. Est: \$500 to \$600

Boris Trajkov emigrated to Australia from Yugoslavia in 1967, quickly coming to the attention of A.S.I.O. and the Victorian Police for a variety of reasons. He was employed by the SBS for several years and was instrumental in setting up a charity for the Macedonian community, for which he received the O.A.M. The charity was ultimately liquidated, and questions were asked in relation to missing funds which resulted in a court cases. Boris was required to repay over \$1 million.

Post war he served as a Police Superintendent in the Transvaal Police, later being awarded the D.C.M. when fighting in German East Africa. HIGHLDERS.; British War Medal and South African Bilingual Victory Medal, both impressed named 2ND LT. D. SUTTIE. with M.I.D device affixed to Victory ribbon. 'For devotion to duty. This Warrant Officer, by his untiring energy and devotion to duty has set an excellent example to the N.C.O.'s and men of the regiment'.

290 D.C.M.'s issued to South African Forces in WW1, 96 to the South African Infantry.

Lieutenant David Suttie was born on 1/8/1869, in Inverarity, Scotland. A ploughman by trade he was serving with the 3rd Battalion Royal Highlanders (Militia) when he enlisted into the 2nd Battalion Royal Highlanders on 10/12/1886 with the service # 3122. He had previously been rejected due to his chest being underdeveloped. He served with the 2nd Battalion in England until transferring to the reserve on the 12/3/1893 as a Corporal, discharging 18/10/1898. He joined the Dundee City Police serving with them 29/3/1893 – 31/1/1900 until he was recalled for the Boer War. There are numerous newspaper articles mentioning him in Police matters and in sporting activities in Dundee. His British service records show he served in South Africa 12/2/1900 – 9/12/1902 with the 2nd Battalion

discharging to the reserve (with the rank of Sergeant) in South Africa. His South African records show that, he joined the Transvaal Town Police serving with them 17/2/1901 – 30/6/1908, rising to the rank of Superintendent. He moved to Johannesburg and was employed as an electric pumpman by the Chamber of Mines.

During WW1, he attested for service in the South African forces on 11/11/1915 with the service # 1451, then aged 46 years, and was promoted to Sergeant-Major on 23/11/1915. He served with 'A' Company, 7th South African Infantry in German East Africa from 1/12/1915 until 22/2/1917, as part of the force operating against von Lettow-Vorbeck. As part of 2nd South African Infantry Brigade they initially took part in General Smuts' two-pronged invasion of G.E.A., being part of the column directly commanded by Smuts himself. In the period January to May 1916, 7th S.A.I. took part in operations south of Mount Kilimanjaro, including the ill-fated battle of Salaita Hill on 12 February, the capture of the Latema-Reata Hills on 11 March, and the crossing of the Himo River. In May 1916 the regiment was transferred to Van Deventer's column, taking part in the march southwards from Dodoma to Morogoro, finally reaching Kilossa in October. He spent a month in hospital in November and December 1916. In January 1917 he was promoted Acting Regimental Sergeant Major and returned to South Africa the following month, where he was appointed 2nd Lieutenant on 28 March. He re-embarked for German East Africa on 18 June but was admitted hospital on 27 September. He returned to the Union, suffering from malaria, and was released from service on 22/12/1917. He re-enlisted in the 1st S.A.I. on 23/8/1918, on this occasion giving his age as 39 when, in fact, he had just turned 50! He was finally discharged on 10/2/1919 and died on 8/5/1941 in Johannesburg, South Africa.

412. WW1 Australian Military Medal and bar medal group to Lance Corporal Oliver Leonard Sims of the 15th and 8th Field Ambulance, who was recommended for the DCM at 'Glencorse Wood', instead being awarded the M.M, with his additional award granted for rescuing U.S. and Australian soldiers who had been wounded at the Battle of Bullecourt. Military Medal (G.V.R.), with second award bar, impressed named 6900 PTE. O.L. SIMS. 15/F.A. AUST. A.M.C.; 1914 – 15 Star, impressed named 6900 PTE O.L. SIMS. 8 F.AMB. A.I.F.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 6900L-CPL. O.L. SIMS. 8 F.AMB. A.I.F. court mounted for display and come with copies of service records, war diary extracts and photographs. Est: \$2500 to \$3500

M.M.: 12 December 1917, London Gazette: 'Near Glencorse Wood, east of Hooge, on the night of 20 September 1917, this Private showed great courage and determination. After several unsuccessful attempts had been made to find the Left Regimental Aid Post in Glencorse Wood, which had been newly established, Private Sims led his squad out and by dint of sheer courage and determination, despite heavy enemy shell fire and the darkness of the night, succeeded in locating the R.A.P. He and his squad brought back a wounded man to the Relay Post and then guided up fresh bearers. Prior to this action, this Private and his squad had done much heavy carrying, His action won the confidence and admiration of all his comrades'.

Second Award Bar to M.M. 14 May 1919, London Gazette: 'This N.C.O. on the 29th and 30th September 1918 at Bullecourt carried continuously under Machine Gun and heavy Shell Fire for 36 hours. At intervals during the night, he also had to carry through Gas. This N.C.O. showed a fine example to his Squad, and through his courage and endurance, many wounded, both Australian and American were safely evacuated to the Wagon Loading Post'.

Lance Corporal Oliver Leonard Sims was born on 11/6/1896 at Kensington, South Australia. Pre-war he was employed as an engine cleaner on the railways. Whilst he had previous military service of 3 years with the cadets (compulsory service at the time), he had been rejected for military service due to his below average height of 5'3". He was however accepted for the A.I.F. on 6/6/1915 with his mother's permission, as he was under 21 at the

time. Probably due to his size he was assigned to the 8th Field Ambulance with the service # 6900 and departed Australia on 10/11/1915 bound for the Middle East. The 8th F.A. was formed in Egypt in January 1916 as part of the doubling of the A.I.F. He was transferred to the 15th Field Ambulance (15th Brigade, 5th Division) on 24/2/1916 remaining with them for the duration of the war. It is believed he was employed in the Bearer Division of The Field Ambulance, which was made up of the Bearer Division, The Tent Division and The Transport Division. The Field Ambulance at full strength composed of 10 Officers and 224 men. The Bearer Division had 18 stretcher squads each of 6 men.

He landed in France with the unit on 28/6/1916 and was immediately involved in the battles of Fromelles, Somme and Bullecourt. He was awarded the Military Medal for actions on 20/9/1917. He was originally recommended for the Distinguished Conduct Medal, but it was downgraded to the M.M. He received a gunshot wound to his left thigh on 9/4/1918 near Hamel and was subsequently evacuated, returning to the unit on 25/4/1918 to join in the fighting at Villers-Bretonneux. On 24/9/1918 he was promoted to Lance Corporal. His second award of the Military Medal was granted for actions during the Battle of St. Quentin Canal between 29 -30/9/1918. At the conclusion of the war, he remained in England until embarking for Australia on 6/7/1919. He discharged in South Australia on 20/10/1919 residing there until his death on 28/10/1965 in Woodville S.A.

413. WW2 'Invasion of Sicily' Military Medal group to Regimental Sergeant-Major Michael Rodger, 2nd Battalion Royal Scots Fusiliers, who was recommended for the D.C.M. for his gallantry on the beaches of Sicily during the early hours of 10 July 1943. Military Medal (G.V.I.R), impressed named 3124671 W.O. CL. 2. M. RODGER. R.S. FUS.; British General Service Medal (G.V.I.R), with clasp PALESTINE, impressed named 3124671 CPL. M. RODGER. R.S. FUS.; 1939 -45 Star, Italy Star, War Medal (1939-45) with M.I.D. device affixed, Army Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (G.V.I.R), impressed named 3124671 W.O. CL. 2. M. RODGER. R.S. FUS. Court mounted for display with copies of M.M. citation, medal roll, London Gazette extracts, and extracts from the History of R.S.F. Est: \$2000 to \$2500

'The Unit Landing Officer was wounded on landing at 0400rs 10th July. This W.O. was his assistant, carried on with his work in a very cool and unperturbed manner. The work was complicated in that the Bn had two assembly areas on account of the advance leading off the right-hand corner of the beach. This W.O. ran everything in a calm and orderly way, during the bombing of the beach and never failed to send veh and men up to his Bn as soon as they were ready to leave the Beach Area'.

Warrant Officer Class 2 Michael Rodger was a pre-war regular who probably enlisted in the late 1920's. He qualified for the GSM Palestine when serving pre war with the 1st Battalion, his rank on the GSM is Corporal however the medal roll shows Company Quarter Master Sergeant. He was serving with the 2nd Battalion during the Sicily/Italian campaign with the rank of Warrant Officer Class 2, being awarded the Military Medal for his actions on 10/7/1943 during the landing at Sicily. As the ships closed with the shore, a high wind rose as the moon went down and brought on a blustering night, and there was much sickness among the troops in the landing craft. Through a corridor of naval craft 'XXX Corps' moved towards the Pachino Peninsula and XLII Corps in the general direction of Avola, an anxious and uncomfortable voyage of five miles.

The Royal Scots Fusiliers lowered a first assault flight into the sea at 1.15 a.m. It consisted of 'A', 'B' and 'C' Companies and Battalion Headquarters, loaded into 12 landing craft. The

swell delayed the forming up of the flotillas and the first wave did not land at its appointed place, a small bay opposite Cassibile, until 3.45 a.m. 'A' Company was on the right, 'B' in the centre and 'C' on the left. 'A' Company beached 300 yards to the south of their fixed position and some delay was caused in the northward march, in course of which they encountered and rushed a pillbox. The wireless sets, drenched in salt water, refused to function and Colonel MacInnes, still out at sea, had no information about events on the beaches nor of the situation of 'D' Company which was still afloat in landing craft. Battalion Headquarters landed in three assault craft at 4.25 a.m. This was not well done, according to Colonel MacInnes, as the craft conveying his second-in-command, himself, and the beach naval party set them down on a rock in deep water and half an hour was lost before they could land. The headquarters staff refused to swim, as the precious wireless sets which remained to them would have shared the fate of the others. A Commando unit which should have landed to the north to soften up the beach defences did not arrive until the Fusiliers were completely disembarked. 'D' Company appeared at 4.25; its landing craft had struck ground in three feet of disturbed water and the company had to wade ashore, accompanied by some attached troops, holding equipment and ammunition overhead to keep them dry. At some points on the beaches the Navy had used grappling irons to tear away the defensive hedges of barbed wire, but the Fusiliers relied upon Bangalore torpedoes brought for the purpose. A distant Italian field battery shelled the foreshore and the passage of a minefield proved difficult. The battery and the minefield both inflicted some casualties, including Major V. McNeil-Cooke, M.C., commanding Headquarter Company, who had been Adjutant of the Battalion after the return from Dunkirk in 1940, and five men of 'B' Company. Its immediate difficulties overcome, the Battalion eventually moved off northwards from the assembly position towards Syracuse at 5.30 a.m. 'B' Company was leading, followed by the reconnaissance and order groups, 'C' Company, 'D' Company, rear headquarters, regimental aid post and 'A' Company less one platoon. Company Sergeant-Major Rodger and Sergeant Guthrie were left on duty at the assembly points. Rodgers is mentioned in the 'History of the Royal Scots Fusiliers' three times. He was subsequently promoted to Regimental Sergeant Major of the battalion and awarded a M.I.D.

414. Royal Victorian Medal (E.II.R.), unnamed as issued in original Royal Mint Case.

Written on the inside lid 'Ron's silver medal from the Queen'. Comes with handwritten note 'Ronald Truluck Butler for the Queen', telephone #. Est: \$300 to \$400

Ronald J Truluck was born in January 1928, in Battle, Sussex. In April 1960 he married Laura Dunn in London.

415. Royal Red Cross, 1st Class (R.R.C.), G.V.R. era cased medal. Silver-gilt, gold and enamel, on short lady's bow riband, in Garrard, London, case of issue, the top lid very worn, but serviceable. Est: \$400 to \$600

Sea Gallantry Medal: 14 May 1913. Board of Trade records state:
'At 10.45 a.m. on 11 January 1913, during a very heavy gale, the Dunelm, of Sunderland, England, stranded on Seaton Sea Rocks, Blyth and became a total wreck. The North Blyth Volunteer Life Saving Apparatus Company arrived at 11.20 a.m. but gear had to be carried over rocks for about 900 yards. The tide was running swiftly and eventually the gear had to be abandoned. A seaman jumped overboard with a line attached to him and swam to a ledge of rocks which two members of the L.S.A. Company had reached. The line was used for the whip and the remaining 14 members of the crew were landed on the ledge. During the operations the whip fouled the rocks and Marsden jumped into the sea to clear it. He was twice washed away and nearly drowned but was rescued by Gibney and Archibold. After reaching the rocks, the men had to make their way or be assisted to the shore. The tide came in and marooned six men. Kelsey, Robertson and Scott were the last of the rescuers whose retreat was cut off, but they remained on the rocks until all the crew were landed. Nixon went off to the ledge in a small boat and rescued two men. McCarthy then took out a small boat. The four remaining men got into it, but it capsized, and McCarthy was nearly drowned. Brown and Beading thereupon took out the boat and tried to reach one of the rescuers named Hurrell, but he sank before they could reach him. They, however, rescued three other men.'

William Arthur Marsden was born on 12/4/1876 in Goole, Yorkshire. He joined the Royal Navy as a Boy 2nd Class on 9/6/1892. He served on a variety of H.M. Ships and shore bases over the next 27 years. He transferred to the Coast Guard as a Boatman at Winterton in December 1903, in which place he remained employed until removing to Blyth Haven in 1911. Awarded his L.S. and G.C. Medal in January of the latter year, he was advanced to Leading Boatman in May 1912, shortly prior to his S.G.M.-winning exploits. The Board of Trade granted the Silver Medal and £2 to Marsden, and Bronze Medals and £2 to nine other rescuers from the Life Saving Apparatus Company or Cambois Lifeboat, Marsden's services being further recognised by the award of the Tynemouth Medal after a meeting of the Trust held on 19 February 1913.

As per the following report published in The Times, Marsden and his fellow rescuers received their awards from George V on 16/12/1913:

'His Majesty listened to moving stories of unselfishness and pluck at Buckingham Palace yesterday, when he decorated a number of men, many of them hailing from the North-country, who had distinguished themselves by acts of special gallantry in saving or attempting to save life. The King, who seemed deeply touched by the narratives, pinned medals to the breasts of various recipients, and afterwards shook hands with them.'

Posted to President IV (base of the Admiral in command of the Coast Guard and Reserves) from 1/10/1916 – 3/4/1919 and discharge to shore pension.

419. Royal Humane Society Bronze Medal awarded to Isaac Osborne for saving Alice Woodland on 17/8/1881. Royal Humane Society Bronze Medal period engraved ISAAC OSBURN. 17 AUG. 1881. With copy newspaper article. Est: \$150 to \$200

Isaac Osborne was awarded the bronze medal for saving Alice Woodland, who fell into a well 30 ft. deep, at Pokesdown, near Bournemouth on 17/8/1881.

420. A rare 'Answers Medal for Heroism' to Daniel Ryder, the first person awarded the medal for a double act of gallantry. Answers Medal for Heroism, period engraved DANIEL RYDER 10TH JUNE 1892. Comes with copies of newspaper articles and research. Est: \$500 to \$600

Extract from Answers 19 March 1892: 'The First Award - The first application made was on behalf of Daniel Ryder, a London crossing sweeper, and, after an interview with Mr Ryder, and careful investigation, we have decided to make him the recipient of our first medal. The medals, however, are not yet ready, but as soon as they are finished, we shall present them. On October 23rd, 1891, a hansom-cab horse took fright, and bolted at a terrific rate down Waterloo Place, making direct for the flight of steps at the end of Carlton House Terrace. Had it not been for Daniel Ryder, who, at imminent risk to his life, and at the critical moment, sprang to the horse's head, and taking hold of the reins succeeded in pulling him up within a few feet of the steps, the horse, cab and occupants would have been precipitated to the bottom. Fortunately, however, owing to this act of bravery the occupants escaped unhurt. On February 16th, 1892, Daniel Ryder again distinguished himself. As a loaded van was descending Waterloo Place, the horse took fright and bolted. Several vehicles narrowly escaped collision, as, owing to the state of the ground, the drivers experienced greatest difficulty in pulling up. At the junction of Waterloo Place and Pall Mall the affrighted animal, whose speed was increased by the shouts of the spectators, turned to the right and proceeded along Pall Mall on the wrong side of the road. Ryder, who happened to be coming in the opposite direction, pluckily sprang to the horse's head, grasped the reins, and succeeded in pulling him up after a short struggle, in the course of which the horse and van got onto the pavement. We consider that these acts of Daniel Ryder deserve public recognition, and although his application was made four days before we were first open to such, we have decided to present him with the first Answers Medal'.

Not much is known about Daniel Ryder, but the occupation of 'crossing sweeper' was performed by the poorest of people, it consisted of sweeping the footpath ahead of the well to do. The streets of the Victorian period were often filthy from horse droppings and other refuse. In his detailed account of the lives and work of crossing sweepers, Henry Mayhew concluded that, "taken as a class, crossing-sweepers are among the most honest of the London poor. They all tell you that, without a good character and 'the respect of the neighbourhood,' there is not a living to be got out of the broom". He had previously assisted in the apprehension of an armed offender 'Joseph Moriarty!' who had shot a passer-by in Pall Mall in 1883.

421. 1805 Matthew Boulton's Medal for Trafalgar. White metal, 48mm, sharp details as struck, with correct impressed rim, with much of the original frosted finish, some light plate loss, in an Elkington leather case. Est: \$300 to \$500

422. Waterloo Medal to Assistant Surgeon Andrew Colvin of the 2nd Battalion, 59th Foot. Waterloo Medal period engraved ASSIST. SURG. A. COLVIN 2ND BATT 59TH REG.FOOT, comes with copy documents and research. Est: \$1700 to \$2000

Andrew Colvin was born in England in 1795. British Army records show that he joined the army sometime before 1812 as a Hospital Mate and promoted to Hospital Assistant on 25/6/1812. On 31/8/1813 Colvin was promoted to Assistant Surgeon, at this time serving with the 59th Regiment of Foot (2nd Nottinghamshire). Following his service at Waterloo, Colvin was placed in a reserve capacity on half pay, before being transferred to the 21st Regiment and embarking for the West Indies in March 1819. In October 1820, in Tobago, Colvin contracted 'Black Fever' and died of illness on 22/10/1820. His medical report graphically explains the symptoms of his illness and records that treatment included giving him mercury, both internally and by "friction". In 1827, the 21st Regiment returned to England, having lost 14 officers and some 400 men, mostly to disease.

423. Crimean War Medal group and silver shoulder belt plate to Captain Richard Weld Litton, who was present for the siege of Sebastopol with the 31st of Foot and was

later elected as the Member of Parliament for Coleraine Privy Councillor. Crimea Medal (1854), 1 clasp, SEBASTOPOL, period engraved LIEUTT. RICHD. WELD LITTON. 31st Regt: Turkish Crimea (1855) medal, Sardinian issue, period engraved R LITTON CAPN XXX1 REGT suspension contemporary replaced with swivel hoop suspension; matching miniatures and silver 31st Regiment Shoulder-belt front plate in original case made by J. Captain Richard Weld Litton was born at Altmore, Tyrone, Ireland in 1833, the son of Edward Litton. His Grandfather, also named Edward Litton, served as an officer of 37th Regiment and saw action at the Battle of Bunker Hill in 1775. Commissioned Ensign on 17/10/1851 by purchase with the 31st Regiment, Lieutenant by purchase on 25/3/1853. The 31st deployed to the Crimea and was at the siege of Sebastopol 1854 – 55. After the war finished the regiment was garrisoned at various points in the Mediterranean, it was sent back to India in 1858. He was appointed the Adjutant on 7/3/1856 and Captain by purchase on 23/4/1858. Not long after this he transferred to the 30th Foot on 25/6/1858, possibly as the 31st was going to India. By 24/8/1859 he had resigned his commission and married Mary Stewart, daughter of Sir Hugh Stewart. He became the M.P. for Coleraine and a Privy Councillor, dying on 28/1/1905 in Dublin.

424. Crimea Medal to Royal Marine William Whitingham who served 21 years and fought in the Crimea on the H.M.S. Sidon. Crimea Medal (1854), 1 clasp, SEBASTOPOL, period engraved 66. Co. WM. WHITINGHAM. R.M. H.M.S. SIDON. Comes with copy of service records and correspondence. Est: \$200 to \$300

William Whitingham was born in Southampton in 1823, he enlisted into the Royal Marines on 26/10/1842 (with a bounty of 3 pounds), serving with them until 19/1/1864, completing 21 years of service. During the Crimean War he served on the Sidon (a first-class paddle frigate) from 2/12/1852 – 30/7/1856. The Sidon served in the Black Sea 1854–55. In April 1854 she blockaded the coast from Kavarna to the mouths of the River Danube. In September, in the Allied invasion of the Crimea, she was assigned to escorting the French troop transports, and assisted the French line-of-battleship Algiers, which had gone aground in Eupatoria Bay. She was then sent to monitor Russian movements around Odessa, and on 4 October attacked a marching column of 12,000 men on their way to the Crimea. On this occasion a Russian rocket hit her funnel. Post war he continued to serve in the Coastguard until retirement having spent some 17 of his 21 years afloat.

425. New Zealand War Medal to Private James Cunningham, 2nd Battalion - 14th Foot, who served in New Zealand 1861 – 1866 and further served in Australia discharging in Melbourne 1869. The 14th was the last British Army unit to be garrisoned in Australia, ending this tradition in the Swan River Colony. New Zealand War Medal 1861 – 1866, impressed named 660 JAMES CUNNINGHAM, 2ND BN 14TH REGT. Comes with copies of medal roll and British Army Worldwide Index and newspaper articles. Est: \$500 to \$600

The 2nd Battalion 14th Foot was stationed at Queenstown in Cork, Ireland when in 1860 it was deployed to Auckland, New Zealand. Upon arrival, one detachment was sent to Napier and another to Wellington. Cunningham was part of the detachment sent to Napier and later Auckland and Otahuhu. The regiment was present at the siege of Te Arei and served thereafter in Taranaki and saw a fair bit of fighting. In September 1866, the regiment returned to Auckland before departing to Australia in October. Between 1867 – 69, The 14th served in New South Wales, Western Australia, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania. Cunningham discharged in Melbourne, Victoria on 20/2/1869 prior to the battalion returning to England. Two companies served in Western Australia from 1868 - 69, one being stationed

in Perth at the Pensioner Barracks, the second in Fremantle in the Military Barracks. The Officer's Mess was on St Georges Tce, near Milligan St and still exists today.

426. India General Service Medal (1854), with clasp BURMA 1885 - 7. Period engraved 300 Pte W Page. 1st Bn York L.I. Comes with copies of medal roll and embarkation list. Est: \$150 to \$200

William Page was born in 1863 and enlisted on the 28/8/1882. On the 19/9/1883, he embarked for India on the SS Serapis. His medal and clasp are confirmed. The battalion was in Burma in 1886. The roll shows that by 19/4/1888 he had been transferred to the reserve.

427. British North Borneo Company Medal 1897, with clasp PUNITIVED EXPEDITION. Silver medal, gold plated by Spink and Son, London, the S on son is partially removed. Impressed marked SPECIMEN to the rim. Est: \$150 to \$250

428. India and Boer War medal group to Sergeant George Henry Chapman, who served with the 1st Battalion Gordon Highlanders in India at the Battle for the Dargai Heights, later serving in the Boer War. A crack shot, he was part of the winning team for the Queen's Cup in 1896. India General Service Medal (1895), 2 clasps, PUNJAB FRONTIER 1897 – 98, TIRAH 1897 – 98, period engraved 3807 Lc Cp G H Chapman 1st Bn Gord Hrs; Queen's South Africa Medal (1899 -1902), with 5 clasps, CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, TRANSVAAL, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named 3807 SGT. H. CHAPMAN. 1ST GORDON HIGHRS.; International Order of Good Templars Medal, engraved to reverse 'South African Campaign 1899/1902 For Steadfastness Bro. Sergt. G. Chapman. and The Army Rifle Association's 'Queen's Cup' Medal, in silver, dated 1896, period engraved 1st Battalion, The Gordon Highlanders'. No. 3807 Lance Corporal G.H. Chapman engraved on rim; 47.5mm, 104.87g, in original box by Elkington (broken at hinge). Comes with copies of service papers, medal rolls and newspaper article. Est: \$400 to \$500

Sergeant George Henry Chapman was born in 1872 in Doncaster, Yorkshire. He was working as a board finisher when he enlisted in Leeds with the Gordon Highlanders on 2/4/1891, whilst serving with the 3rd Volunteer Battalion Yorkshire Regiment. After initial recruit training, he was assigned to the 2nd Battalion on 3/7/1891 and subsequently posted to the 1st Battalion on 5/4/1892.

He joined the 1st Battalion in India, serving with there from 26/2/1892 – 18/10/1898. He was part of the 1st Battalion's shooting team, winning the Queen's Cup in 1896.

He was present at the charge on the Heights of Dargai, during which two Victoria Crosses were won by the battalion. Lieutenant Tillard of the 3rd Gurkha Scouts described the charge: "The scene makes me shake with excitement even now. The Gordons, pipers playing, and men cheering, never stopped or wavered although many of them were down. It was one wild continuous rush of men all eager to get to the enemy. The sight was magnificent and the excitement so intense that I for one, although I was shouting at the top of my voice, felt the tears springing up into my eyes and could not keep them back". The battalion lost 1 officer and 2 men killed, with 6 officers and 35 men wounded. He was promoted to Lance Corporal on 8/3/1898 and served in Egypt from 19/10/1898 - 8/12/1898 and promoted to Corporal in April 1899. He deployed to South Africa between 16/2/1901 – 22/10/1902, being promoted to Sergeant on 4/1/1902. One medal roll records him having served with both the 1st Battalion Gordon Highlanders and the 23rd Mounted Company. Post war he found employment as a school janitor in Dundee.

429. An Anglo Zanzibar War, China and WW1 service medal group to P.O. Hayden of the Royal Navy, who fought in the Anglo Zanzibar War on H.M.S. St George - the shortest war in modern history, lasting only 45 minutes. He further served in China, personally receiving his medal from King Edward VII. China Medal (1900), impressed

named to A.J. HAYDEN. A.B. H.M.S. WALLAROO, 1914 – 15 Star, impressed named 175471. A.J. HAYDEN. P.O.1. R.N., British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 175471. A.J. HAYDEN. P.O.1. R.N., Royal Navy Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (G.V.R.), impressed named 175471 A.J. HAYDEN. P.O.2. H.M.S. MINOTAUR. Court mounted for display. Chief Petty Officer Alfred James Hayden was born on the 27/5/1878 at Portsea, Hampshire. An errand boy by trade, he joined the Royal Navy on the 1/8/1893 (just turned 15) as a Boy 2nd Class. He served on a variety of H.M. ship and shore bases including H.M.S. St George from 7/9/1895 – 18/2/1898. The Anglo-Zanzibar War was fought between the United Kingdom and the Zanzibar Sultanate on 27/8/1896. The conflict lasted between 38 and 45 minutes, marking it as the shortest recorded war in history. He served on H.M.S. Wallaroo between 14/3/1900 – 7/12/1903 and served in the China War from 4/8/1900 – 31/12/1900, his medal being presented by the King on 8/3/1902. During WW1 he served on the H.M.S Black Prince from 21/4/1914 – 3/1/1916, H.M.S. Umpire from 22/8/1917 – 4/3/1919 and fought at the Second Battle of Heligoland Bight and was one of the first to launch torpedoes at the German ships in the action. He discharged to shore pension 4/3/1919. The 1939 census records him working as a general labourer in Portsmouth, which is where he died on 15/1/1944.

430. Boer War and WW1 medal group to Sergeant Thomas Henry Hughes, who served in South Africa with the 3rd V.B., Royal Welsh Fusiliers as a bugler, later being twice wounded, whilst serving served with the 19th (Bantam) and 14th Battalions R.W.F. during WW1. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, TRANSVAAL, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named 8013 BGLR T.H. HUGHES.VOL COY RL WELSH. FUS.; British War and Victory medals, impressed named 45570 SGT. T.H. HUGHES. R.W. FUS. Court mounted for display and comes with copies of Boer War service papers, medal rolls, M.I.C. and newspaper articles. Est: \$200 to \$300

Sergeant Thomas Henry Hughes was born in 1883 at Holywell, Flintshire, Wales. A labourer by trade, he was serving with the 2nd V.B. Royal Welsh Fusiliers when he volunteered for a short service attestation with the 3rd Battalion, Royal Welsh Fusiliers on 7/2/1902 (service # 8013). At 19 years of age, he was a small man at 4'11" tall and 104lbs (47kg) and served in South Africa from 3/3/1902 – 12/7/1902, he appears on the medal roll as a 'Bugler'. On returning to England, he was discharged time expired on 10/8/1902. Post war he returned to Holywell, as the 1911 census records him working as collier worker. During the Great War, he served with the Royal Welsh Fusiliers with the service # 45570, initially with the 19th Battalion. The battalion was a 'Bantam Battalion' and part of the 119th Brigade, 40th Division. The Bantams were created from mainly miners who were under height but fit with the minimum requirement being 5' The 40th Division landed in France in June 1916, where he was wounded in action twice, with the Flintshire County Herald dated 25/5/1917 records him amongst the wounded with the rank of Corporal and then again on 11/1/1918. He finished the war with the 14th Battalion as a Sergeant.

431. Boer War and WW1 medal group to Engine Room Artificer Tom Lang Maxey, Royal Navy who for a time was on the Australia Station. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), impressed named T.L. MAXEY. E.R.A. H.M.S. FEARLESS; 1914 – 15 Star, impressed named 152680 J.L. MAXEY, E.R.A.1., R.N.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 152680 T.L.MAXEY. E.R.A.1. R.N.; Royal Navy Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (E.VII.R.) impressed named T.L. MAXEY. E.R.A. 1CL. H.M.S. POWERFUL. Court mounted for display and comes with copy service record, medal roll and newspaper article. Est: \$300 to \$400

Engine Room Artificer First Class Tom Lang Maxey, who was born 21/9/1866 in Bedfordshire, a qualified fitter and turner, he enlisted into the Royal Navy on the 7/1/1890 as an Engine Room Artificer (E.R.A) 4th Class. He served on a variety of H.M. ships and shore installations including the Ringarooma and the Crescent from 3/2/1891 – 16/7/1896, being part of the Auxiliary Squadron of the Australia Station. During the Boer War he served on H.M.S. Fearless from 15/11/1897 – 8/11/1900 (145 QSA Medals issued to the Fearless). He was promoted to E.R.A 1st Class 15/9/1902 being pensioned to shore on 10/1/1912. Recalled for WW1 service and served on the King Alfred from 2/8/1914 – 15/10/1914, Victory from 16/10/14 – 7/12/1914, Assistance from 8/12/1914 – 14/7/1918, Victory II 15/7/1918 – 10/3/1919 and demobilised. He died in October 1936 at Battersea, London, his medals were discovered in a Princess Mary tin in 1976 (as per newspaper article).

432. Boer War and WW1 medals to Chief Engine Room Artificer Class James Fullarton, Royal Navy who later served on submarines. Queen's South Africa (1899) no clasp, impressed named J. FULLARTON. E.R.A. H.M.S. MONARCH.; British War and Victory Medal, impressed named 268347 J. FULLARTON. C.E.R.A. 1. R.N.; Royal Navy Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (E.VII.), impressed named 268347 JAMES FULLARTON. C.E.R.A. 2CL. H.M.S. BLENHEIM. Court mounted for display and comes with copy service record and medal roll. Est: \$400 to \$500

Chief Engine Room Artificer 1st Class James Fullarton was born on 28/7/1871 at Saltcoats, Ayrshire. The 1891 census records him as living in Ardrossan and workings as an Engineer Apprentice Fitter. He enlisted into the Royal Navy on the 13/11/1894 as a Acting Engine Room Artificer 4th Class, his occupation being recorded as a fitter and turner. Over the next 26 years he served on a variety of H.M. ship and shore bases including: H.M.S. Monarch (guard ship at Simons Bay, South Africa) from 26/1/1897 – 27/7/1900, qualifying for the Queen's South Africa Medal. During WW1 he served on H.M.S. Thames (submarine tender and served at Sheerness) 5/8/1914 – 30/9/1917. H.M.S. Maidstone (the principal depot ship for the 9th Submarine Flotilla at Harwich for the duration of the hostilities) 1/10/1917 – 5/12/1917, H.M.S. Dolphin (submarine depot ship) 6/12/1917 – 6/10/1918, H.M.S. Eaglet for the Kilfullert (anti-submarine sloop) 16/10/1918 – 30/9/1919. Post war he continued to serve finishing at Pembroke II being invalided to shore on 7/1/1920. He was awarded his LS & GC Medal 1909. Promoted to Chief Engine Room Artificer 1st Class 1/10/1911.

433. Boer War medals to Private William Jackson of the East Lancashire Regiment. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with three clasps, CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, JOHANNESBURG, impressed named 3244 PTE. W. JACKSON. E. LANC. REGT.; King's South Africa Medal (1901), with two clasps SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named 3244 PTE W. JACKSON. E. LANC. REGT.; Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (E.VII.R.), impressed named 3244 PTE W. JACKSON. E. LANC REGT. Mounted for display on red card backing. Comes with copies of service records, medal rolls, 1911 census and Chelsea Pension extract. Est: \$30 to \$350

William Jackson was born in St Mary's, Cavan, Ireland in 1873. A farm labourer by trade he enlisted into the East Lancashire Regiment on 26/9/1891 and was given the service # 3244. After recruit training at the Depot, he was posted to the 2nd Battalion on 16/9/1891 serving with them at Gibraltar. On returning to England, he was posted to the Depot on 11/9/1897 followed by the 1st Battalion on 18/12/1897. He served in South Africa with the Battalion from 13/1/1900 – 25/11/1902. During the campaign the Battalion suffered the loss of 1 officer killed/died of wounds, 6 died of disease, 1 wounded and 1 missing/P.O.W., 19 men killed/died of wounds, 36 died of disease, 39 wounded, 31 missing/P.O.W. On returning to England, he was posted to the Depot, then 1st Battalion 2nd Battalion for service in India from 27/10/1904 – 1/11/1911. He struggled to pass his annual shooting proficiency test failing twice in 1907 and 1909 regaining it in 1910.

On returning from India, he discharged on 28/6/1912. He was awarded his Long Service and Good Conduct Medal in October 1909 with gratuity. As an old soldier it is highly probable that he served in WW1 in some capacity.

434. Boer War medals to Drummer Connelly of the 2nd Battalion, The Black Watch. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with four clasps, CAPE COLONY, PAARDEBERG, DRIEFONTEIN, TRANSVAAL, impressed named 6936 DMR: T. CONNELLY. 2: R. HIGHRS.: King's South Africa Medal (1901), with two clasps, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named 6936 DMR. T. CONNELLY. RL: HIGHRS. Court mounted for display, comes with copies of medal rolls. Est: \$250 to \$300

Drummer T. Connelly was lucky to survive the war as the Second Battalion Black Watch was badly mauled at Magersfontein on 11/12/1899 where it suffered more than 300 casualties. In the following year the battalion was in action at Paardeberg with casualties again severe - nearly 100. It was also at the investment of Prinsloo's force in the Brandwater Basin in July 1900. By the end of the war the battalion had lost 130 in battle, another 71 through disease, whilst more than 350 had been wounded.

435. Boer War Queen's South Africa Medal with 5 clasps to Lieutenant Reginald Norman Joseph Stourton, who hailed from Tasmania, who served with the Scottish Horse and the 3rd Australian Commonwealth Horse. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 5 clasps, CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, TRANSVAAL, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named LIEUTENANT R.N.J. STOURTON. SCOTTISH HORSE. With matching miniature in case marked F.A. FLINT. LIVERPOOL ST, HOBART. Comes with copies of medal roll, newspaper articles and research. Est: \$400 to \$500

Lieutenant Reginald Norman Joseph Stourton was born in Morven, Tasmania, Australia on 4/10/1877. Educated at Hutchins School and Christ College Hobart and later at Surbiton House Naval School in England. He enlisted with the 1st Scottish Horse rising to the rank of Sergeant (service # 7666, later 577). He served from 30/1/01 to 29/4/02. Discharged medically unfit, he returned to Tasmania and was commissioned as a Lieutenant to serve in the 3rd Australian Commonwealth Horse (Tasmania) having been given command of the Ross detachment of 'I' Company.

At wars end, he returned to Tasmania on 9/8/1902 and was presented with his medal by Lady Edeline Strickland. Post war he returned to farming in Tasmania, dying in 1943.

436. Queen's South Africa Medal with 5 clasps to Trooper Frederick William Gosper of the 3rd New South Wales Mounted Rifles. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 5 clasps, CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, TRANSVAAL, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, IMPRESSED NAMED 3467 TPR F.W. GOSPER. N.S. WALES. M.R. Comes with copies of roll, and newspaper articles. Est: \$400 to \$500

Frederick William Gosper was born on 6/1/1879 in St Leonards, Sydney, New South Wales. He served in South Africa with the 3rd New South Wales Mounted Rifles from April 1901 to April 1902. The Regiment saw hard fighting and tough soldiering during the campaign and were highly successful. A Charles John Gosper of the 3rd NSW M.R. died on 26/11/1901 whilst crossing a river, (perhaps a relative), with Frederick was one of the contributors to his memoriam 26/11/1902. He returned to Australia residing in N.S.W. until his death on 1/9/1968 at Concord. Sydney, New South Wales. His service medal is numbered 3467, whilst the roll records it as 3464.

437. Queen's South Africa Medal with 6 clasps to New Zealander, Sergeant William Niven Eady, who served with the 5th and the 8th Contingents during the war. He was one of the 168 New Zealanders chosen to attend the Coronation for King Edward VII in

London in 1902. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 6 clasps, CAPE COLONY, RHODESIA, TRANSVAAL, ORANGE FREE STATE, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named 5871 SERJT W.N. EADY. 5TH N.Z. CONT. and 1902 Coronation Medal in bronze, unnamed as issued. Comes with copies of service records, medal rolls and newspaper article. Est: \$1200 to \$1500

Sergeant William Niven Eady was born on 6/8/1874 at Millers Flat, Central Otago, NZ. He was working as a dredgeman when he enlisted with the 5th Contingent for service in South Africa being given the service # 1625 and assigned to the 15th Company (Otago section). The 5th contingent had a total strength of 591 (including 71 reserves). They sailed at the end of March and disembarked at Beira at the end of April. These two corps were, along with the 6th New South Wales Imperial Bushmen, intended to form the 2nd Brigade of the Rhodesian Field Force, which crossed Rhodesia, under the leadership of General Carrington, they entered the Transvaal from the north-west. The two New Zealand contingents took part in the attempt to relieve Colonel Hore at Elands River. The two contingents saw hard soldiering and tough fighting and gained an excellent reputation. At the end of May and beginning of June 1901 the 4th and 5th contingents sailed for home and discharge. Eady re-enlisted on 15/1/1902 with the 8th Contingent (South Island Regiment - G Squadron) as a Sergeant, with the new service # 5877.

The 8th Contingent was formed in response to British requests for another contingent. The South Island Regiment left from Lyttelton on the SS Cornwall. Both contingent ships' arrived in Durban on 15/3/1902. Total strength of 1120 (including 109 reinforcements). The 8th Contingent built on the reputation of previous contingents and were well thought of as professional fighting soldiers. The 8th contingents sailed for home in July 1902. Eady was chosen to be part of the New Zealand 1902 Coronation contingent and was awarded the Coronation medal in bronze. Whilst some 6500 New Zealanders qualified for the QSA, there were only 168 medals issued to the New Zealanders for the 1902 Coronation. He died in Dunedin Otago, N.Z. in 1956.

438. Queen's South Africa Medal to Private James Frederick Trustam, 13th Hussars, who was twice wounded during the Boer War and is mentioned in the 13th Hussars official History in South Africa. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with two clasps, TRANSVAAL, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, period engraved 4179 Pte J.F. TRUSTAM. 13/Hrs. Comes with copies of service records Boer War & WW1, medal rolls and extracts from 'The History of the XIII Hussars'. Est: \$150 to \$200

Sergeant James Frederick Trustam was born on 25/12/1879 in Enfield, Middlesex. A clerk by trade, he enlisted into the 13th Hussars with the service # 4179 on 7/11/1898 at Aldershot. It is unknown why Trustam did not go with the 13th to South Africa in December 1899, however he joined them on 19/5/1900 serving there until returned to England 25/3/1901. He was severely wounded at Newcastle on 19/10/1900. The History of the XIII Hussars (P107 & 205) records 'Boreman's Farm was burnt by General Talbot-Coke. The next morning patrols were sent out, but about 11 A.M. the half squadrons posted at Donga Spruit and the platelayer's hut were ordered to retire to their respective quarters, while C Squadron and headquarters returned to Newcastle. On the 9th a sudden order came for the 13th to proceed from Newcastle to Umbana. It started at 9 A.M. Umbana and Bastion Hill were clear of Boers, but Private Trustam was wounded in the arm by a sniper, of whom there were a few about'. He was medically discharged on 10/7/1901 because of his wound. A note on his WW1 service papers stating that he is entitled to two wound stripes for the Boer War.

The 1911 census records him as Army Pensioner, working for the National Telephone Co as a cashier in Hounslow. During WW1 he enlisted at Shoreditch on 30/10/1915 with the 3rd Battalion Queen's (Royal West Surrey Regiment), rising to the rank of Orderly Room

Sergeant. He was discharged on 31/3/1920. The 3rd Battalion was for home service only and a training unit. He died at Shore-by-Sea, Sussex, on 24 February 1963. The unit history records his name as Trustram rather than Trustam.

439. Queen's South Africa Medal to Private S.J. Smith, 3rd Dragoon Guards, who died of disease in 1901. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 2 clasps CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, impressed named 4232. PTE. S.J. SMITH. 3RD DGN GDS. Comes with copy medal roll and newspaper article. Est: \$150 to \$250

Private S.J. Smith died of enteric fever at Heilbron on 10/5/1901. His war in Africa only lasted a few months as the regiment deployed to South Africa on the SS Victorian on 22/1/1901. Arriving in February they were put into Colonel Bethune's brigade and had frequently sharp fighting in the Orange River Colony. During the Regiments stay in South Africa it lost 1 officer killed in action, 2 wounded, 5 men killed in action/died of wounds, 55 died from disease, 15 wounded, and 13 missing/P.O.W.

440. Queen's South Africa Medal to Private Manklow of the 18th Hussars, who was reported missing on 29th July 1901. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899) with 3 clasps ORANGE FREE STATE, LAINGS NEK, BELAST, period engraved 4953 Pte N. MANKLON. 18/ Hrs. Comes with copy of medals rolls and extract of the action on the 29/7/1901 when he was 'missing in action'. Est: \$150 to \$250

Private Manklow was possibly a time expired soldier who was recalled for the Boer War, the 18th Hussars unit history in South Africa by Major Charles Burnett, records him as one of the men who joined the Regiment after the Siege of Ladysmith.

441. Boer War medals to Private Robert Knipe of the 2nd Battalion Royal Scots Fusiliers, who was court martialled in 1901 for allowing Boer prisoners to escape. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 4 clasps, CAPE COLONY, TUGELA HEIGHTS, RELIEF OF LADYSMITH, TRANSVAAL, impressed named 2545 PTE R. KNIPE. 2: R. SCOTS FUS: King's South Africa Medal (1902), with 2 clasps, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named 2645 PTE R. KNIPE. RL SCOTS FUS. Comes with copies of service papers, medal rolls and court martial record. Est: \$200 to \$250

Robert Knipe was born on 13/5/1869, in Barony, Glasgow. A builder by trade he enlisted into the Royal Scots Fusiliers (service # 2645) on the 27/4/1889, at the time he was serving with the 4th Volunteer Battalion, Scottish Rifles. After recruit training he was assigned to the 2nd Battalion R.S.F. on 16/7/1892 and remained with the battalion until discharging time expired on 6/5/1902. He served with the battalion in India between 19/9/1890 – 28/11/1896. Unfortunately, he was charged with striking his superior officer and was in the cells from 14/4/1893 – 22/7/1893. He returned to England on 23/7/1893 and transferred to the reserve on 21/12/1896. Recalled for the war in South Africa on 9/10/1899, he served there until 28/4/1902. The battalion saw some hard fighting during the campaign and Knipe was once again court martialled on 3/8/1901 for 'Allowing prisoners to escape', lucky for him he was acquitted. Posted to England on 29/4/1902 for discharge on 6/5/1902. He returned to Glasgow where he died on 23/6/1929.

442. Queen's South Africa Medal to Private T. Waddle of the 2nd Battalion Royal Lancaster Regiment, who was badly wounded at the Battle of Spion Kop. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 4 clasps, ORANGE FREE STATE, RELIEF OF LADYSMITH, TRANSVAAL, LAINGS NEK, impressed named 2675 PTE. T. WADDLE. R. LANC. REGT. Comes with copies of medal roll and newspaper article. Est: \$250 to \$350

T. Waddle was badly wounded at Spion Kop on the 24/1/1900 and was subsequently invalided out of the Army on 19/11/1901. He is also entitled to the clasp South Africa 1901.

During the campaign the battalion lost 11 officers killed, 9 wounded, and 1 missing/P.O.W., 128 men killed, 40 died from disease, 249 wounded and 66 missing/P.O.W. Most of these casualties having resulted from the action at Spion Kop.

443. Queen's South Africa Medal to Private George Thomas Docksey, North Staffordshire Regiment, who fought in the Sudan, South Africa and later with the R.F.A. in France during WW1. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with two clasps TRANSVAAL, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, impressed named 4471 CPL. G.T. DOCKSEY 2/N. STAFF. REGT. It comes with copies of two service records, medal rolls, M.I.C. and census extract. Est: \$100 to \$150

Corporal George Thomas Docksey was born in 1876 in Hanley, Staffordshire, he was working as a collier (coal mine worker), when he enlisted into the North Stafford Regiment (service # 4471) on 10/4/1894. After recruit training at the Depot, he was posted to the 2nd Battalion on 14/7/1894. He was posted to the 1st Battalion 24/9/1895 to deploy with them to Egypt from 24/9/1895 – 11/10/1897. The battalion fought in the Second Sudanese War. The 1st Battalion were based initially at Wadi Halfa but moved to Gemai to avoid a cholera outbreak. In September the battalion took part in the action against the Dervish Army at Hafir, which was decisive in ending the campaign. As a result, the North Staffordshire Regiment received the unique "Hafir" battle honour, given to no other British regiment. At the conclusion of the campaign the battalion was posted to India where he served from 12/10/1897 – 2/3/1902, being promoted to Lance Corporal on 31/1/1898 and passing a veterinary course on 14/1/1899. The 2nd Battalion was in South Africa fighting the Boers since 1899 and possibly as a result of casualties or by the fact he was qualified from his veterinary course, he was posted to the 2nd Battalion in South Africa serving there from 3/2/1902 – 10/10/1902, being promoted to Corporal on 20/3/1902. He may have served in the North Staffords Mounted Company being veterinary qualified. At the war's end in June 1902, the 2nd battalion returned to England on the SS Galeka in October that year. On returning to England, he transferred to the Army Reserve on 30/11/1902, re enlisting on 6/4/1906 and discharged on 9/4/1910 time expired. The 1911 census records him as married living in Hanley, working as a furniture remover.

He reenlisted on 5/8/1914 at Shilton (service # 67, later re numbered 805418), with the 231st Midland Brigade Field Artillery T.F. (based at the Artillery Drill Hall on Victoria Square, Shelton, Staffordshire), as a Shoeing Smith. 46th (North Midland) Division and served in France from 28/2/1915 – 7/7/1915 and 13/2/1916 – 1/1/1917. On 21/8/1916, he was buried under chalk during an enemy barrage, being pinned for over 1 hour. He was medically discharged service with the Silver War Badge on 21/9/1917. He was working for the Royal Doulton Pottery Factory for a period after leaving the Army and died in 1933 at Stoke on Trent Staffordshire. He is also entitled to the Queen's Sudan Medal, Khedive's Sudan Medal, 1914 – 15 Star, British War and Victory Medals, and the Silver War Badge.

444. Queen's South Africa Medal to Private James Stewart who died of disease on the 1/2/1902 in Kimberley, South Africa. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 3 clasps, CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, TRANSVAAL, impressed named 3505 PTE J. STEWART. GORDON HIGHRS. M.I.C. Comes with copies of service records, soldiers' effects extract, medal rolls and newspaper articles. Est: \$100 to \$150

James Stewart was born in Aberdeen in 1883, a 17-year-old farm labourer he enlisted on 3/7/1900 into the 3rd Militia Battalion Gordon Highlanders. He was serving with the 22nd Company, Mounted Infantry when he died of disease (enteric fever) on the 1/2/1902 in Kimberley.

445. Queen's South Africa Medal to Lieutenant Ernest Sidney Bowden Smart of the 94th Company, 24th Battalion of The Imperial Yeomanry. Queen's South Africa Medal

(1899), with three clasps, CAPE COLONY, SOUTH AFRICA 1901, SOUTH AFRICA 1902, period engraved Lieut: E.S.B. Smart. Imp Yeo. Comes with copies of Officers list, newspaper articles and census extract. Est: \$250 to \$350

Lieutenant Ernest Sidney Bowden Smart was born on 9/4/1877 at Islington, Middlesex. His father was an accountant, and it is highly probable that he was working in the profession or similar. He was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant with the 21st Finsbury Rifle Volunteer Corps on 21/2/1900. He volunteered for service in South Africa serving with the 94 (Metropolitan Mounted Rifles) Company, 24 Battalion Imperial Yeomanry. Being promoted to Lieutenant April 1901. On returning from the war, he resigned his commission in September 1902 and died on 24/11/1938 in Middlesex.

446. Queen's South Africa Medal to Lieutenant Gustav Otto Schmidt, of the Western Province Mounted Rifles, who was wounded in action at Klampjedoorns on 14/6/1901. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899) with 1 clasp CAPE COLONY, period engraved Lt G.O. Schmidts. Prov. M.R. Comes with copy medal roll. Est: \$200 to \$300

Lieutenant Gustav Otto Schmidt served with Colonel De Lisle's column as per note on the roll. General Sir Henry de Beauvoir De Lisle, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., D.S.O., who during the Second Boer War, commanded the Australian Brigade, a mobile column comprising the 6th Battalion Mounted Infantry, the West Australian Mounted Infantry, the South Australian Imperial Bushmen and the New South Wales Mounted Rifles. He is also entitled to the clasp Orange Free State, South Africa 1901, South Africa 1902. He may also be the Gustav Schmidt who served with the Buffalo Volunteer Rifles and is also entitled to the South Africa Medal with clasp 1877-8 (Gaika-Gcaleka War). Lt Schmidt is named Schmidts on his medal, but Schmidt on the roll.

447. Queen's South Africa Medal with 6 clasps to Sergeant Evan Prowse, who was Mentioned in Despatches, whilst serving with the South African Light Horse, having survived the fierce fighting at Laings Nek and Tugela Heights.

Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with six clasps, CAPE OLONY, TUGELA HEIGHTS, ORANGE FREE STATE, RELIEF OF LADYSMITH, LAINGS NEK, BELFAST, impressed named 719 SERJT. E. PROWSE. S.A. LI HORSE. With unofficial silver M.I.D. device affixed to ribbon. Comes with copy of medal roll and London Gazette. Est: \$300 to \$400

M.I.D.: 8/2/1901, London Gazette

Sergeant Evan Prowse would appear to have served his entire time with the South African Light Horse. It is possible that he is Evan Arthur Powell Prowse who was born on 24/8/1878 in Maidstone Heath, Hound, Southampton, and who died on 9/7/1924 in Somerset West, Cape Province, South Africa. The South African Light Horse had a outstanding fighting record during the Boer War.

448. Queen's South Africa Medal and miniature to Trooper William Kehoe, who served with the Prince of Wales Light Horse, Gorrings Flying Column, Brabants Horse and Cape Colonial Forces. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with 2 clasps, CAPE COLONY, ORANGE FREE STATE, impressed named TPR. W. KEHOE. GORRINGES F.C. with miniature in fitted case. Comes with copies of medal rolls and discharge extracts. Est: \$200 to \$300

William Kehoe served with the 2nd Brabant's Horse from 27/2/1900 – 16/7/1900, Prince of Wales Light Horse (service # 27682) discharging 12/6/1901. He also appears on the Gorrings Flying Column roll with note Acting Sergeant with the Cape Colonial Forces.

449. Queen's South Africa Medal to Corporal A. Cripps of the 29th Tsomo Rifle Club, with only 33 medals issued to members of this unit. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with clasp CAPE COLONY, impressed named CPL A. CRIPPS. TSOMO M.R.C. Comes with copy of the medal roll. Est: \$200 to \$300

450. Queen's South Africa Medal to Lance Corporal William Ivor Morgan of the Midland Mounted Rifles, who was killed in action on the 20/6/1901 at Waterkloof, having previously served at Sanna's Post with Roberts Horse. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), 4 clasps, RELIEF OF KIMBERLEY, PAARDERBERG, DRIEFONTEIN, TRANSVAAL, impressed named 2247 TPR. W.I. MORGAN. ROBERTS HORSE. Comes with copies medal rolls, newspaper articles, census and extract from the Llansteffan War Memorial. Est: \$500 to \$600

Lance Corporal William Ivor Morgan was born in Llansteffan, Wales in 1881. His father was the master of the local school for 15 years. Following the death of his father, William sailed for South Africa in April 1896 (at the time he was 15) and was working on a farm near Capetown. He moved on to work for the railways as a telegraph operator on the Capetown to Kimberley line. On 10/1/1900 he enlisted into E Squadron, Robert's Horse (service # 2247) for a 1-year engagement, serving with them until 3/1/1901. He promptly enlisted into the Midland Mounted Rifles the same day 3/1/1901 (service number 32) and served with the unit until killed in action on the 20/6/1901 at Waterkloof. The M.M.R losses on the day were 8 killed and 11 wounded (of whom another 3 died). At the time the unit was following up the Boer forces under General Malan who had been repulsed in the attack at Richmond. As per the newspaper article, Morgan was with General Frenches column in the advance on Kimberley, fought at Sannas Post, was present for the surrender of Cronje at the battle of Paardeberg. He injured his leg and on recovery worked for 3 months with the Royal Engineers as a telegraphist, until he re-joined his unit, only to fall in battle.

451. A scarce 'Defence of Mafeking' Queen's South Africa Medal to Ernest Mitchell Gates of the Mafeking Railway Volunteers and Mafeking Town Guard. Queen's South Africa Medal (1899), with clasp DEFENCE OF MAFEKING, impressed named E.M. GATES. MAFEKING TOWN GD. Comes with copies of medal roll, Freemason ledger extract, death certificate and photograph of grave. Est: \$1200 to \$1400

Ernest Mitchell Gates was born on 22/7/1877 in Uitenhage, Eastern Cape, South Africa. The Freemason Lodge book for the Astral Lodge, Mafeking records him being a member with his occupation recorded as 'fitter'. He served during the siege of Mafeking and is recorded on the rolls for the Mafeking Town Guard and Mafeking Railway Volunteers. The Mafeking Railway Volunteers was a body of some 130 men was known during the Defence of Mafeking as the 'Railway Division', they played a major role in the defence, constructing shell-proof trenches, armoured railway carriages, they made a ordnance foundry ,casting cannonballs and seven pounder shells, as well as fighting. He died on 4/6/1950 in Port Elizabeth.

452. Somaliland, WW1 and North Russia medals to 35 year veteran, Lieutenant Archibald John Jenkins Richardson, Royal Navy. Africa General Service Medal (1902), 1 clasp, SOMALILAND 1902 – 04, impressed named A.J.J. RICHARDSON. P.O.1CL. H.M.S. HIGHFLYER.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named LIEUT. A.J.J. RICHARDSON. R.N.V.R.; Royal Navy Long Service Medal (E.VII.R.) impressed named A.J.J. RICHARDSON. O.O.1CL. H.M.S. HIGHFLYER. Court mounted for display, comes with copies of service papers (enlisted and commissioned), medal rolls, 1911 and 1939 census. Est: \$300 to \$400

Lieutenant Archibald John Jenkins Richardson was born on 7/7/1870, at Stoke Damerel, Devon. He enlisted into the Royal Navy straight from school, commencing to serve on

7/9/1885, as a Boy 2nd Class. He served on a variety of H.M. ship and shore bases including H.M.S. Camperdown, when on 22/6/1893, she collided with and sank the battleship H.M.S. Victoria with 358 deaths, including Vice-Admiral Sir George Tryon. H.M.S. Highflyer (awarded A.G.S.M.), He was awarded Long Service and Good Conduct Medal 1903. He discharged to shore pension on 8/7/1910 and the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve. He had been steadily working his way through the ranks being promoted to Chief Petty Officer by April 1905. He was recalled for WW1, serving on H.M.S. Powerful from August 1914 - 25/10/1915. H.M.S. Victory VI from 26/10/1915 -14/11/1915 when he was commissioned as a Temporary Sub-Lieutenant, R.N.R., for service with the Royal Naval Division. Promoted Temporary Lieutenant on 24/8/1917, he was later appointed to be 3rd Grade Transport Officer for duty on the staff of the Principal Naval Transport Officer with the North Russia Expeditionary Force at Archangel. He transferred to the Royal Naval Reserve on 21/8/1919, being demobilised in February 1920. He died on 10/4/1941 in Leatherhead, Surrey.

453. H.M.S. New Zealand Medal named to Leading Stoker Francis John Larkin, who later served on the monitor H.M.S. Severn and shelled the Germans at Yser in 1914 and later destroyed the SMS Königsberg in German East Africa. H.M.S. New Zealand Medal (1913). Silver medal period engraved F.J. LARKIN and suspension mounted. Comes with copy service record and medal roll. Scarce. Est: \$300 to \$400

Leading Stoker Francis John Larkin was born on 29/11/1890 in Dumbarton, Scotland. A postman by trade he enlisted into the Royal Navy on 15/3/1908 serving until 29/5/1914 and discharged to the Royal Fleet Reserve. Recalled for WW1 2/8/1914 and served on the H.M.S. Severn until 31/12/1917. The Severn was a monitor and at the Battle of the Yser in 1914, she bombarded German troops as well as artillery position, surviving an attack by the submarine U-8 when a torpedo passed under the shallow draught vessel. In July 1915, the monitor was towed to the Rufiji River delta in German East Africa where she and Mersey then assisted in the destruction of the German light cruiser Königsberg. She continued to serve on the East Africa station until 1918. Discharged to shore 19/4/1921.

454. WW1 and WW2 medals to Malcolm McGilvray, who served with the Nelson Battalion, Royal Naval Division at Antwerp and was discharged to munitions work, later serving in the Home Guard during WW2. 1914 Star, impressed named CLY3/2312. M. Mc.GILVRAY, A.B.R.N.V.R. NELSON BTN R.N.D.; British War Medal, impressed named C.3-2312 M. MC GILVRAY. A.B. R.N.V.R.; Mercantile Marine Medal, impressed named CHARLES WELLBELOVE; Victory Medal, impressed named C.3-2312 M. MC GILVRAY. A.B. R.N.V.R.; Defence Medal and War Medal (1939-45), both unnamed as issued. Court mounted for display and came with copies of R.N.V.R. & Home Guard service papers, medal rolls, seaman's I'D cards and 1939 census. Est: \$250 to \$300

Malcolm McGilvray was born on 27/1/1895 at Bowmore, Isle of Islay, Argyllshire, Scotland. An apprentice fitter by trade he enlisted into the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve on 7/4/1913. He was mobilised on 21/8/1914 and on the 22nd was mustered into the Nelson Battalion R.N.D. serving until 27/10/1914, including at the Defence of Antwerp October 1914. On returning to England, he was awarded a payment for clothing he'd lost at Antwerp. He was posted to Vivid 1 from 28/10/1914 – 16/11/1914. H.M.S. Louvain from 17/11/1914 – 21/9/1915 when his discharge was approved to return to his old pre-war employer British Steam Navigation Company for 'munition work'. He spent the remainder of the war employed in the Mercantile Marine services, qualifying for the Mercantile Marine Medal. The 1939 census records him as living in Wallsend, Northumberland, with his occupation as 'works engineer'. He enlisted into the Durham Home Guard 5/4/1942 however he was medically discharged due to ill health 25/4/1943. Post war he retained his links with the sea as per his British Seamen's identity cards dated 1950 and 1952.

455. WW1 medals to Chief Petty Officer Edward Veitch, who served with the Anson Battalion, Royal Naval Division at Antwerp and Gallipoli, only to be invalided out of service in 1917. 1914 Star, impressed named C1/2654 E.VEITCH, A.B. R.N.V.R. ANSON BTTN RND. With copy clasp affixed to ribbon; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named C.1-2654 E. VEITCH. C.P.O. R.N.V.R. Court mounted for display and comes with copies of service records, medal rolls, pension card, casualty record extract, passenger manifest extract and death certificate. Est: \$250 to \$350

Chief Petty Officer Edward Veitch was born on 31/10/1893 at Edinburgh. An apprentice fitter and turner, he enlisted into the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve on 13/5/1913 (service # C1/2654). He was mobilised for the war on 2/8/1914. By the 22/8/1914 he was entered onto the nominal roll of the Anson Battalion under the service # B/114 and served at the defence of Antwerp in October 1914.

The R.N.D. deployed to Egypt and subsequently Gallipoli. Promoted to Acting P.O. on 8/2/1915, sent to hospital from C.C.S. (casualty clearing station) at 'W' beach Gallipoli with jaundice on 6/12/1915 and to hospital at Mudros on 8/12/1915. Re-joined the unit on 8/1/1916, embarked H.M.T. Minnewaska at Mudros on 15/5/1916 to Marseilles landing on 20/5/1916. A single undated note states 'Detached from Anson Battalion to Stavros whilst serving with the M.E.F.' By the 14/12/1916 he was discharged to UK for home establishment only, being posted to the 3rd Reserve Battalion, Portsmouth on 22/12/1916, to be invalided out of the service on 18/1/1917.

Post war emigrated to America and became a citizen in 1933. He visited England in 1939 with the ships manifest, giving his occupation as 'salesman'. He returned to England several times, dying in Edinburgh on 19/2/1967.

456. WW1 medals to Private James Gwynn, who was wounded at Ypres in May 1915, receiving a gunshot wound to the face whilst serving with the 2nd Life Guards. 1914 Star, with original 5th Aug – 22nd November 1914 clasp, impressed named 6339 PTE J. GWYNN. 5-LRS.; British War and Victory medals, impressed named 6339 PTE J. GWYNN. C OF LRS. Court mounted for display and comes with copy service records, extract war diary and newspaper article. Est: \$250 to \$350

Private James Gwynn was born in 1882 in Derry, a labourer by trade, he enlisted into the 5th (Royal Irish) Lancers on 13/11/1901 in Belfast (service # 6339). On 16/3/1903, he was in confinement for striking his superior officer (7 days). Tried by District Court Martial, receiving 56 days prison returning to duty 18/4/1903. His troubles were not over yet as he was sentenced by the civil power to 1 month imprisonment with hard labour for a felony on the 13/10/1904, returning to duty 12/11/1904. He transferred to the Army Reserve on 13/11/1909.

Mobilised for the Great War on 5/8/1914, he was attached to the 2nd Life Guards on 10/8/1914, landing in France with them on 10/9/1914. Whilst the main body of the 2nd L.G. landed in France 8/10/1914, one of the squadrons was detached to help form the Household Cavalry Composite Regiment, which moved to France with 4th Cavalry Brigade of the 1st Cavalry Division and saw action at Mons and in the subsequent withdrawal to and beyond the Marne, battle of the Marne, and later at Ypres. Based on his arrival date to France, it would appear that Gwynn was with the detached Squadron being part of the Household Cavalry Composite Regiment. He was badly wounded with a gunshot wound to his face on 13/5/1915, which also gave him a severely fractured upper jaw. At the time he was serving with 'C' Squadron when the regiment occupied the trenches located ½ mile east of Potijze (Ypres salient) on the night of 12- 13 May. All movement near the trenches during daylight being impossible. At 4am on the 13th a violent German artillery barrage commenced which continued until 7am, there were two small breaks in the barrage during which the Germans launched attacks which were beaten off. However, Germans had penetrated the front trenches on both sides of the Regiment which necessitated a withdrawal back to GHQ line

under heavy shell fire. The Regiment reformed on the G.H.Q. line and held the support line with the C.O. being wounded whilst doing this. Casualties for the day amounted to 2 officers killed, 3 wounded including the C.O., 27 men killed and 82 wounded, including Gwynn. He was subsequently evacuated to England. He remained in England for the remainder of the war being posted to various Cavalry units until 7/7/1917 when he was transferred to the Labour Corps (655 H.S. Employment Coy). He was discharged on 4/2/1919 with a pension of 9 pence a day for life.

457. WW1 medals to Private Peter Bird, Coldstream Guards, who was wounded in action on 3/10/1914. 1914 Star, impressed named 6671 PTE P. BIRD. C. GDS. with clasp affixed to ribbon; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 6671 PTE. P. BIRD. C. GDS. Court mounted for display. Comes with copies of Guards service record extract, M.I.C., medal roll, S.W.B. roll, 1911/1939 census. Est: \$250 to \$350

Peter Bird was born on 29/3/1888 at Nazeing, Essex. A barman by trade, he enlisted into the Coldstream Guards on 5/3/1906 at London. The 1911 census records him as 'Soldier Valet' in the 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards. In 1914 the 2nd Battalion was stationed at Windsor. He landed in France on 13/8/1914 with the Coldstream Guards (4th Guards Brigade, 2nd Division). Wounded in action on 3/10/1914 with a gunshot wound to his right calf. At the time of being wounded, the 1st Battalion was involved in an action on the 3-4th October which resulted in 2 men killed and 5 wounded. It is possible that he was wounded serving with the 1st Battalion during this incident. He was subsequently medically discharged on 9/11/1917, qualifying for the silver war badge, which records GSW right leg and tetanus. He married in March 1918, with his occupation recorded as 'Bank messenger', a position which he was still employed in 1939 as recorded on the census. He died on 9/2/1951 in Kent.

458. WW1 medals to Private William Henry Catt, 2nd Battalion Royal Sussex Regiment, who was an Old Contemptable, being arrested for desertion in September 1918. 1914 Star, impressed name 7972 PTE W. CATT. 2/R. SUSS.R. with replica clasp affixed.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 7972 PTE W. CATT. R. SUSS. R. court mounted for display comes with copies M.I.C., medal rolls, newspaper article and pension card. Est: \$200 to \$250

William Henry Catt is believed that he enlisted in 1904. The 2nd Battalion Royal Sussex Regiment landed in France on 12/8/1914. He was possibly wounded as he was transferred to the 2/6th Battalion Scottish Rifles (service # 37542), which was a home service battalion. The unit moved to Kilworth in Ireland in January 1917 and a year later to Galway. It was disbanded in Ireland 15/4/1918. A newspaper article dated 21/9/1918 records him being remanded in Police custody as a deserter.

459. A comprehensive WW1 New Zealand medal and badge group to Corporal Herbert James Bowden who served with the 1st Battalion Otago Regiment from 1914 to 1919, having fought in Egypt, Gallipoli, France and Flanders.

Corporal Herbert James Bowden was born on 30/5/1893 in Roxburgh, Central Otago, New Zealand. A tailor by trade he had previously served with the 14th Regiment when he enlisted on the 14/8/1914 into the Otago Battalion with the service # 8/171. He sailed from N.Z. on the 16/10/1914 bound for Egypt, arriving 3/12/1914. The battalion deployed to Lemnos on the 12/4/1915 in preparation for the landing at Gallipoli. Herbert was hospitalised at Lemnos with measles on the 23rd and did not land with the battalion on the 25th, but joined the battalion on the Peninsula on the 23rd of May. He served with the battalion until hospitalised at Malta 16/8/1915, re-joining them on 19/10/1915. The battalion evacuated the Peninsula in late December returning to Egypt on 27th December. The battalion saw hard fighting along with the Australians and suffered accordingly. In 1916 the battalion was split into 2 battalions, Herbert remained with the 1st Battalion. They deployed to France, landing on 6/4/1916 serving until wars end. He was lucky to survive unscathed, especially at Passchendaele. He was promoted to Lance Corporal in March 1918 and Corporal in July 1918. Post war he departed England for N.Z. 1/2/1919 for discharge in April. He died on 11/8/1973 in Sandringham, Waitakere, Auckland. It is rare to find such a complete set of ANZAC Gallipoli service-related items to a N.Z. soldier.

460. Sergeant Thomas Fleming Anderson was born in St Arnaud, Victoria in 1898. A carter by trade, he originally enlisted into the A.I.F on 3/8/1915 in Melbourne with the service # 2556. After initial training at the Depot, he was posted to the 6th reinforcements, 21st Battalion. He has a second set of enlistment papers with the service # 3551 dated 8/10/1915 assigning him to the 11th reinforcements 14th Battalion. He departed Melbourne on 11/10/1915 bound for Egypt. Initially posted to the 14th Battalion on 4/2/1916, he was transferred to the 46th Battalion on 3/3/1916. The 46th Battalion (12th Brigade, 4th Australian Division) moved to France on 8/6/1916, its first major battle at Pozieres. On 11/4/1917 it took part in the attack at Bullecourt where after managing to fight through to its objectives, the 46th was forced to withdraw with heavy casualties. He survived Messines and was sent to hospital in England (sick) 26/8/1917 – 30/8/1917 and 21/10/1917 – 11/4/1918. He was back in time to face the Germans at Villers-Bretonneux, being wounded by shell fire, buried and suffering contusions to his back on 2/5/1918, he was evacuated back to England again until the 15/8/1918. On returning to the battalion, he received a written commendation from Major General MacLagan the Commander of the 4th Division dated 20/10/1918 'Congratulating him for his courage and determination displayed whilst leading his platoon in the attack on 18/9/1918 at St Quentin.' This was their last action for the war, Anderson was promoted to Sergeant on 1/10/1918. He returned to Australia on 20/4/1919 landing in Melbourne on 8/6/1919 for discharge 31/7/1919. He died in 1957 at Brunswick, Victoria.

461. WW1 Australian medals to Private L.G. Cuthbertson, a 17th Battalion Gallipoli veteran, who served in France with the 20th Battalion and who saw heavy fighting in 1916 at Pozieres, where he was 'accidentally wounded'. He was later wounded at Arras in 1917 and was A.W.O.L. just prior to Amiens in August 1918, receiving a year

of hard labour as a result. 1914 -15 Star, impressed named 845 PTE L.G. CUTHBERTSON. 17BN. A.I.F.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 845 PTE. L.G. CUTHBERTSON. 17BN A.I.F. Swing mounted as worn, with original ribbons, missing rear pin, with length of green and white ribbon (20th Battalion colours) pinned to Victory ribbon and rising sun collar badge. Comes with copy service records, war diary extract and newspaper articles. Purchased direct from the family. Est: \$500 to \$600

Leslie George Cuthbertson was born in Alexandria, Cumberland, N.S.W. in 1895/96. A machinist by trade he enlisted into the A.I.F. on 25/2/1915 being posted to 'C' Company 17th Battalion with the service # 845. The 17th Bn left Australia on 15/5/1915, trained in Egypt from mid-June until mid-August, and on 20 August he landed at ANZAC Cove. The Battalion participated in the last action of the August Offensive ' the attack on Hill 60 ' before settling into defensive routine in the trenches. For a short period, part of the 17th garrisoned Pope's Hill, but for most of its time on the peninsular, the battalion was responsible for the defence of Quinn's Post, one of the most contested positions along the entire ANZAC front.

On 2/11/1915 he was evacuated to Egypt by the Hospital Ship Nevasa with jaundice. He remained in hospital until 10/1/1916 when he was returned to duty at Tel el Kibir with the battalion, which was evacuated from Gallipoli in December 1915. He was charged with A.W.O.L. from 14/1/1916 – 16/1/1916. He was posted to 'C' Company, 20th Battalion on 12/3/1916 prior to the A.I.F. deploying to France on 18/3/1916. The battalion entered the trenches for the first time in April 1916 and in the following month had the dubious honour of being the first Australian battalion to be raided by the Germans. The 20th took part in its first major offensive around Pozieres between late July and the end of August 1916. The battalion war diary makes for grim reading relating to their time at Pozieres. Between 24/7/16 - 6/8/1916, the battalion lost 17 officers and 409 men, after being withdrawn for a break, it was back in the trenches at Pozieres on the 21st. Cuthbertson suffered a gunshot wound to his right hand on the same day, the battalion war diary records 1 OR self-inflicted wound. On the next day 'A very quiet day' 1 officer and 4 OR's wounded, 23rd another quiet day with 7 Other ranks wounded. Cuthbertson's records note ;admitted to hospital with wound allegedly to be self-inflicted, there is insufficient evidence to justify a Field Court Martial'. He re-joined the unit on 5/10/1916. The 20th Battalion provided reinforcements for the attack near Flers between 14 and 16 November, launched in conditions that Charles Bean described as the worst ever encountered by the AIF. In 1917, the 20th was involved in the follow-up of German forces after their retreat to the Hindenburg Line and was one of four battalions to defeat a counterstroke by a German force at Lagnicourt, the enemy almost five times as strong. They took part in three major battles before the year was out, second Bullecourt (3-4 May) in France, and Menin Road (20-22 September) and Poelcappelle (9-10 October).

He was wounded receiving a gunshot wound to his back on 29/10/1917 whilst at Ypres. The war diary records on 28/10/17 the battalion transport was caught in a German heavy artillery barrage just as it was being unloaded, 3 men killed and 4 wounded. No casualties recorded for the 29th so it was probable he was hit on the 28th. He was evacuated to the rear until re-joining the battalion on 23/11/1917.

He soldiered on until 7/8/1918. The 20th Battalion had faced the German spring offensive and encountered some particularly severe fighting when ordered to attack at Hangard Wood on 7 April. The battalion was preparing to attack at Amiens on the 8 August when he went A.W.O.L until 15/12/1918. On being apprehended, he faced a Field General Court Martial and was sentenced to 1 year imprisonment with hard labour. He was sent to the No. 5 Military Prison at Les Attaques 14/2/1919 until transferred to England 24/5/1919 with his sentence suspended. He departed England for Australia on 1/7/1919 but failed to board the ship when granted local leave at Capetown on 23/7/1919. He was apprehended a week at quarter to midnight New Year's Eve minus all his Army issue uniforms and equipment. He received 168 hours detention and loss of 28 days' pay. He continued his journey to Australia on 8/8/1919 but his good times in Capetown caught up with him, as he was admitted to the

ship's hospital with V.D., arriving on 17/8/1919 in Melbourne for discharge on 7/11/1919. Bad luck wasn't finished with Cuthbertson just yet, he married in the early 1920's but was charged with 'A capital offence' in 1933. He met a young girl at a train station and went for a walk with her and consensual sex ensued, possibly because of guilt she confided in her boyfriend and Cuthbert was subsequently charged. Medical evidence would appear to confirm that the act was consensual and when the victim refused to appear or give evidence the trial was abandoned. However, his wife then successfully sued him for divorce on the grounds of adultery! He died on 6/9/1956.

462. WW1 medals to Private Arthur Priddle, of the 8th Battalion Royal Welsh Fusiliers who was killed in action at Suvla Bay, Gallipoli on 20/9/1915. 1914-15 Star, impressed named 31626. PTE A.W. **PRIDDLE**. R.W. FUS.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 31626 PTE A.W. **PRIDDLE**. R.W. FUS. Arthur William Priddle was born in 1895 in Rimpton, Somerset. The 1911 census records him working as a paper boy in London. He was working as a gardener when he enlisted into the 3rd Hussars on 1/9/1914 with the service # 23474. He was transferred to the 8th Battalion Royal Welsh Fusiliers (with the new service # 31626) on 15/6/1915 who were serving at Gallipoli at the time.

He landed at Gallipoli on the 27/8/1915 joining the battalion who were at Lala Baba, Suvla Bay. On the 20/9/1915, the battalion marched across the salt lakes to take over the support trenches which they took over at 11:30pm, one-man Private Priddle was killed by a stray bullet whilst going into the trenches. He is buried in a Commonwealth War Grave at Azmak Cemetery, Suvla.

463. WW1 Royal Navy medals to Leading Stoker Townend, who served initially laying mines and post war spending his days residing in a mental hospital, finally dying at the age of 99. 1914 – 15 Star, impressed named SS.112115, E.G. Edgar George Townsend was born on the 4/1/1893 at Mitcham Surrey, a printer's labourer by trade, he enlisted into the Royal Navy as a Stoker 2nd Class on the 30/4/1912. His initial service # being SS112115. After initial training at Pembroke I, he was posted to H.M.S. Intrepid (Apollo-class protected cruiser converted as a minelayer) 31/8/1912 – 7/3/1915 and H.M.S. Magnolia 3/8/1915 – 16/12/1918. Post war he continued to serve on the Magnolia up to 14/12/1924 with small breaks in-between. Unusually he was given a new service number 1/8/1919 being K.58640. Awarded his L.S. & G.C. Medal 7/8/1927. Post war he continued to serve until 4/9/1929 when he was invalided out due to neurasthenia (P.T.S.D.) from the R.N. Hospital at Chatham. The 1939 census records him as residing in the Kent County Mental Hospital Maidstone, Maidstone, occupation postman. He died on 9/5/1982 in Bromley, Kent.

464. WW1 and WW2 Royal Navy medals to Chief Petty Officer Page, who served on Torpedo Boat TB.15 in and as a post war instructor for 10 years at the R.N. torpedo school. 1914 – 15 Star, impressed named J.5089. R.E.PAGE. L.S. R.N., British War and Victory Medals, impressed named J.5089 R.E. PAGE. P.O. R.N., Defence and War Medals (1939 -45), unnamed as issued, Royal Navy Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (G.V.R.) impressed named J.5089 R.E. PAGE P.O. H.M.S. AMBROSE. Court mounted for display, comes with copies of: Service papers, medal rolls and 1939 census. Est: \$200 to \$250

Chief Petty Officer Reginald Ernest Page was born on the 15/6/1893 at Cheltenham, Gloucestershire. An errand boy by trade he enlisted into the Royal Navy on the 17/8/1909 as a Boy 2nd Class (16 years old). He served on Vivid II from 22/2/1914 – 15/1/1916, Defiance 16/1/1916 – 16/10/1916, Attentive from 17/10/1916 – 19/1/1919. Post war C.P.O Page was posted to H.M.S Defiance the Royal Navy's torpedo school some 9 times and served there for approximately 10 years+. Clearly an expert torpedo instructor. Promoted to Chief Petty Officer 12/2/1927. Receiving his Royal Navy Long Service and Good Conduct Medal in 1926. He served until 14/6/1933, when pensioned to shore. The 1939 census records him as a R.N. pensioner C.P.O. living in Cheltenham. Recalled for WW2 he served on Drake I, Defiance, Daedalus II from 16/2/1940 –.

465. WW1 Royal Navy medal group to William Daniel Lester who served on H.M.S. Skipjack, chasing U-Boat's. 1914 – 15 Star, impressed named K.17696. W.D. LESTER. STO.1. R.N.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named K.17696 W.D. LESTER. ACT. L. STO. R.N.; Royal Navy Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (G.V.R.), impressed named K.17696 W.D. LESTER. L.STO. H.M.S. RESOURCE. Court mounted for display and comes with copies of service papers and medal rolls. Est: \$200 to \$250

William Daniel Lester was born on the 5/5/1893 at Bethnal Green, London. A builder's labourer by trade, he enlisted into the Royal Navy as a Stoker 2nd Class on the 16/1/1913. Pre-war he served on a variety of H.M. ship and shore bases. During WW1 he served on H.M.S. Skipjack (Minesweeper) from 5/3/1914 – 3/9/1917. On 18 /11/1914 Skipjack and the 'gunboat circle' were about to start a minesweeping run in the channel hunting U-boats. Post war he continued to serve until pensioned to shore on 15/1/1935, being promoted to Leading Stoker on 11/9/1918 and awarded the Long Service and Good Conduct Medal in January 1934. He was mobilised from 28/9/1938 – 4/10/1938 (Munich Crisis) and recalled for WW2 on 19/2/1940 he served until 21/8/1945.

466. WW1 Royal Navy medals to Leading Seaman Henry John Goodwin, who served at Jutland on the H.M.S. Canada and who later served with the Royal Australian Navy. 1914 – 15 Star, impressed named J. 38929. H.J. GOODWIN. BOY1 R.N.; British War and Victory Medals, impressed named J. 38929. H.J. GOODWIN. A.B. R.N. Court mounted for display and comes with copies of R.N. and R.A.N service papers and medal roll. Est: \$200 to \$250

Henry John Goodwin was born on 27/9/1898 in Norwich, Suffolk, a coach builder by trade, he enlisted into the Royal Navy on 10/3/1915 as a Boy 2nd Class. After initial training, his first ship was the H.M.S. Canada, serving on her from 10/8/1915 – 8/3/1917. She initially served with the 4th Battle Squadron of the Grand Fleet and was at the Battle of Jutland on 31 May–1 June 1916. She fired 42 rounds from her 14-inch guns and 109 6-inch shells during the battle. She fired two salvos at the disabled cruiser Wiesbaden and also fired its 6-inch guns at German destroyers. He further served on H.M.S. Radstock 24/12/1917 – 30/9/1919, in a escort and anti-submarine role. Post war he continued to serve on a variety of H.M. ship and shore bases including the Royal Australian Navy on 26/9/1925 (service # 15037) serving at Cerberus and Platypus. He discharged to shore on 26/9/1928 returning to England. The 1939 census records him as a hotel licensee.

467. WW1 R.N.V.R. medal group to Signaller William John Kimber, who was killed on 5/6/1916, along with Field Marshal, The Lord Kitchener, when their ship H.M.S. Hampshire sank, whilst enroute to Russia as part of a diplomatic mission. Kimber's role as signaller, would have meant he would have been the last contact between the Hampshire and any ship or shore base when the final S.O.S. signal was given. British War and Victory Medals, impressed named L.Z.4346. W.J. KIMBER SIG. R.N.V.R. Court mounted for display with copies of service records and Commonwealth War Graves Commission extracts. Est: \$300 to \$400

William John Kimber was born on 28/10/1897 in Peckham, London. A pipe stamper by trade he enlisted into the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve on 23/11/1915. After training he was assigned to the H.M.S. Minotaur from 6/5/1916 – 11/5/1916 but was transferred to the H.M.S. Hampshire on 12/5/1916, where he served until, he was killed on 5/6/1916. He had previously survived the Battle of Jutland whilst aboard the Hampshire. On 5/6/1916, the ship she was ordered to carry Lord Kitchener and his staff from Scapa Flow on a diplomatic mission to Russia. At the time a heavy gale was blowing, and the escort was instructed to turn back to the shelter of Scapa Flow. Approximately 2km off the Orkney mainland, she struck a German mine which holed the cruiser between bow and bridge, with the lifeboats being smashed against the side of the ship by the heavy seas, when they were lowered. About 15 minutes after the explosion, the Hampshire sank. Of the 735 crew members and 14 passengers aboard, only 12 crew survived, after coming ashore on three Carley floats. A total of 737 were lost, including Kitchener and all the members of the mission to Russia. Kimber's body was never recovered, and he is commemorated on the Chatham Naval Memorial. Kitchener himself was seen standing on the quarterdeck approximately twenty minutes before the ship sink, his body was also never recovered.

468. WW1 Canadian medals to Private Frederick Arthur Kirby of the 5th Battalion (Western Cavalry), C.E.F. who was wounded in action in September 1916.

Frederick Arthur Kirby was born on 9/2/1897 in Reading, Berkshire, England. A labourer by trade, he had previously served 2 years with the Naval Volunteers and was living in Canada. He enlisted on 7/4/1915 into the 46th Battalion C.E.F. After initial training he deployed to France via England lading on the 17/7/1916 being transferred to the 5th Battalion. He was wounded in action on 9/9/1916 receiving a shrapnel wound to his back and neck, evacuated to England and returned to Canada to be medically discharged on 30/7/1917, with the shrapnel still in his chest. He died in Winnipeg in 1961.

469. WW1 service medals to Major W. St. John-Spencer, 9th Battalion, East Surrey Regiment, late Thorneycroft's Mounted Infantry, a veteran of the North-West Frontier and the Boer War, he was wounded eight times and invalided out of the Army in 1916.

British War and Victory Medals impressed named MAJOR W.ST. JOHN-SPENCER, comes with copies of M.I.C., medal rolls and newspaper articles. Est: \$200 to \$250

Major William St. John-Spencer was born in 1876 and served during the Boer War in South Africa as a Lieutenant in Thorneycroft's Mounted infantry (Q.S.A. with 3 clasps and K.S.A. with 2 clasps). With the onset of the Great War in 1914 he was a Lieutenant on the Territorial Force General List (Poplar Battalion, National Reserve) and was appointed Temporary Captain in the 12th (Bermondsey) Battalion, East Surrey Regiment on 12 July 1915. St. John-Spencer served during the Great War on the Western Front in the rank of Temporary Major and second in command of the 9th (Service) Battalion, East Surrey Regiment from 28 August 1916, and was invalided to England on 18 November 1916. Admitted to Mill Bank Hospital, London with a head wound on 21 November 1916, he was discharged 1 month later with permanent injuries. Following his death in 1937, a number of newspaper articles and obituaries stated that Major St. John-Spencer had been aide-de-camp to H.M. King George VI when he was Duke of York and that he had been wounded eight times in all throughout his service in the Boer War, the Great War and on the North-West Frontier of India.

His memory of the Great War was published in the 500 Best Cockney War Stories: 'The Colonel of the Regiment, gifted with the resonant voice of a dare-devil leader, was highly

esteemed for his rigid sense of duty, especially in the presence of the enemy. The Germans had been troubling us a lot with gas, and this kept everyone on the qui vive. Accompanied by the Colonel, the Divisional Commander was making his usual inspection of the front-line intent on the alertness of sentries. In one fire-bay the Colonel stopped to give instructions regarding a ventilating machine which had been used to keep the trench clear of gas after each attack. Meanwhile the General moved on towards the other end of the fire-bay, where the sentry, fresh out from the reserve battalion recruited in Bermondsey, stood with his eyes glued to the periscope. A natural impulse of the General as he noticed the weathervane on the parapet was to test the sentry's intelligence on "gas attack by the enemy," so as he approached the soldier, he addressed him in a genial and confiding manner: "Well, my lad, and how's the wind blowing this morning?"

Welcoming a little respite, as he thought, from periscope strain, by way of a short "chinwag" with one or other of his pals, the unsuspecting sentry rubbed his hands gleefully together as he turned round with the reply: "'Taint 'arf so dusty arter all." Then, suddenly through the corner of his eye he caught sight of his colonel at the other end of the fire-bay. His face instantly changed its cheerful aspect as he breathlessly whispered to his inquirer, "Lumme, the ole man! 'Ere, mate, buzz orf quick—a-a-an' don't let 'Im cop yer a-talkin' to the sentry on dooty, or Jerry's barrage will be a washaht when the Big Noise starts 'is fireworks!"

470. WW1 Royal Navy medals to A.B. Leonard Morris, who served for 2 years aboard H.M.A.S. Australia. British War and Victory Medals, impressed named J.62574 L. MORRIS. A.B. R.N. swing mounted as worn on an unusual 'patented' medal bar. Comes with copies of Royal Navy and Royal Australian Navy service records. Est: \$150 to \$200
Leonard Morris was born in Lavant, Chichester on 6/3/1898. He enlisted into the Royal Navy on 23/11/1916 with the service # J.62574. After initial training he was posted to the H.M.A.S. Australia (R.A.N. service # 8968) on 14/2/1917 and served on her until demobilised on 28/2/1919. Upon return home, he joined the Hampshire Regiment.

471. WW1 New Zealand Territorial Service Medal to Lieutenant William John Foster of the 4th (Waikato) Mounted Rifles, who was wounded in action on Gallipoli, suffered severe malaria attacks but survived the war. In WW2 he was a Major and the 1st New Zealand officer to be wounded in Egypt, receiving multiple shrapnel wounds in an enemy air attack. New Zealand Territorial Service Medal, impressed named LIEUT. W, J FOSTER.(4TH WAIKATO) M.R. (1919). Comes with copies of service records, newspaper articles and photographs. Est: \$150 to \$200

Major William John Foster was born on 21/10/1890 at Te Akatea, New Zealand. A farmer by trade he enlisted into the 1st Company Waikato Mounted Rifles on 21/3/1908, transferring to the 4th Waikato M.R. 1/3/1911 (service # 13/326). His father Joshua Hunter Foster served in the Māori War.

At the outbreak of the Great War, he was the Company Quartermaster Sergeant, being Gazetted as a 2nd Lieutenant. He embarked for Egypt on 16/10/1914, arriving on the 3rd December. He landed on Gallipoli on the 25th or thereabouts. He was wounded in action on 31/5/1915, receiving a slight gunshot wound to his head. He returned to duty on 8/6/1915 being evacuated sick to England in October remaining there until December when he returned to the unit in Egypt. He was hospitalised again this time with severe Malaria from September – December 1918, returning to NZ 19/4/1919, for discharge back to the Reserve on 16/6/1919. Between the wars he remained in the reserve rising to the rank of Major and Quartermaster.

Mobilised for WW2 on 27/9/1939, he was seconded to the 2nd New Zealand Cavalry Regiment and served in Egypt from 14/2/1940. On 31/10/1940 at Garawala (near Marsa Matruh) he was wounded in an air attack receiving multiple shrapnel wounds which was aggravated when the vehicle that was evacuating him crashed into a truck. He was

subsequently evacuated to New Zealand and posted to the retired list 13/7/1944. He died on 15/9/1976 in New Zealand.

472. WW1 Canadian Memorial Plaque to Private Charles Wood Morgan, who was twice wounded in action prior to being shot and killed by a sniper in 1918.

Charles Wood Morgan was born in Staffordshire, England on 17/7/1885. A labourer by trade, he married on 9/3/1914 and had emigrated to Canada pre-war, he enlisted in Toronto, on 14/2/1916 originally with the 170th Battalion. He sailed from Halifax on 30/10/1916 landing in England on 31/10/1916. He was transferred to the 169th Battalion, then to the 116th Battalion on 31/12/1916, serving with the 116th in France from 11/2/1917 until his death on 27/8/1918. He was wounded twice prior to his death, being wounded in the right buttock with shrapnel on the 7/7/1917, and wounded for a second time, this time being hit by shrapnel in his left buttock on the 17/11/1917, when the Battalion was in the Ypres area. He was killed in action during the attack near Monchy, France. The official cause of death was 'Instantly killed by and enemy snipers' bullet during an attack on Bois du Sart. The unit history has a full chapter on the attack which was successfully concluded with the objective taken and 16 guns, 40 machine guns and about 450 prisoners captured. Morgan is buried in the Vis En Artois British Cemetery at Haucourt, France.

473. WW1 Australian gold and enamel watch fob presented to Private George Warris Lorriman of the 8th Battalion AIF, from the Manchester Unity Independent Order of Oddfellows.

Private George Warris Lorriman was a miner from Taradale, Victoria. He enlisted on 5/4/1916 and deployed to France serving with the 8th Battalion A.I.F. from 2/10/1916. He received a serious gunshot wound to his left shoulder on 9/8/1918. He survived to return to Australia 20/5/1919.

474. WW1 Australian gold watch fob presented to Sergeant Samuel Frederick Dunbar who served in Egypt with the 1st Light Horse by the residents of Upper Hunter.

Sergeant Samuel Frederick Dunbar was a stockman from Gundy, N.S.W. enlisted on the 18/8/1915 and served in Egypt with the 1st Light Horse from January 1916, returning to Australia 13/3/1919.

475. WW1 and WW2 Australian family medal group to John Stanley Green, who served with the Imperial Camel Corps.

British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 1250. PTE J.S. GREEN. CML. CPS A.I.F. Comes with copies of service papers. War and Defence Medals (1939-45) and Australian Service Medal 1939-45, all impressed named NX. 55330. A.E. GREEN. Comes with WW2 service extract. Est: \$600 to \$800

John Stanley Green was born in 1896 at Walgett, New South Wales, Australia. A labourer by trade, he enlisted into the A.I.F. on 13/4/1916 and was assigned to the 5th reinforcements, Camel Corps. After initial training he embarked at Sydney on 20/10/1916 bound for Egypt, landing on 3/12/1916. However, he was admitted to the isolation camp at Moascar on 16/12/1916, on discharging from there he was taken on strength of the 1st Light Horse, but transferred to the Imperial Camel Corps and was assigned to No. 4 Company 4/1/1917. He would have been present during the First Battle of Gaza in March, and the Second Battle of Gaza in April and possibly during the raid on the Sana redoubt in August. The battalion then had a break to refit, and Green was posted to the Australian Remount Division at Moascar on 17/8/1917. He remained with the Remount Depot for the remainder of the war until returning to Australia on 26/7/1919 for discharge on 16/10/1919. He died on 15/10/1972 at Warwick Farm, New South Wales.

Alfred Edward Green was born on 20/11/1906 at Walgett, New South Wales, Australia, he enlisted on 28/6/1940 serving until discharge on 28/8/1942. He died on 14/3/2000, in Picton N.S.W.

476. WW1 and WW2 Australian father and son medal groups, Ernest Seaton Smith served with the Australian Cyclist Battalion and 14th Field Coy Engineers, with Rex Seaton Smith serving with Line of Command Signals during WW2. British War and Victory Medals, impressed named 875 SPR. E.S. SMITH. 14F.C.E. A.I.F. with ribbon bar and copy service papers.; 1939 Star, Pacific Star, Defence and War Medals (1939 – 45), Australian Service Medal 1939 – 45, all impressed named NX1640464. R.S. SMITH.; with original card box of issue with accompanying document.; WW2 cloth colour patches (Keith Glyde reference) 701 Eastern Command Sigs, 706 17th Line of Communications Signals, 19 Line of Command Signals, (757) First Australian Army Anti-Aircraft and Fortress.; Sweetheart badge 2.5cm x 2.5cm, miniature Eastern Command signals patch set in white metal frame with miniature rising sun badge affixed to top. Ernest Seaton Smith was born on 13/6/1888 in Kimberley, Northern Cape, South Africa. A French polisher by trade, he enlisted into the A.I.F. on 8/11/1916 at Sydney, he had previously served for 4 years in South Africa with the Western Light Horse. He was assigned to the 10th reinforcements, Anzac Cyclist Battalion with the service #875. He departed Melbourne on 11/5/1917 bound for England, landing at Plymouth on 19/7/1917 and into camp at Parkhouse. 8/9/1917 charged with insubordination to a N.C.O. and received 7 days C.B. On 11/11/1917 he proceeded to France and was taken on strength with the 14th Field Company, R.A.E. He served with the Company until returning to Australia on 20/8/1919 for discharge on 20/9/1919. He died on 16/12/1960 in N.S.W.

Lance Sergeant Rex Seaton Smith was born on 22/10/1921 in Hurlstone Park, N.S.W. He enlisted on the 6/1/1943 serving with various Lines of Command Signals units in Australia and New Guinea, discharging on 10/7/1946.

477. WW1 and WW2 Royal Navy medals to Stoker John Francis Keefe, who served on H.M.S. Hamadryad and Highlander. British War and Victory Medals, impressed named S.S. 118750 J.F. KEEFE. STO. 2. R.N.; 1939 – 45 Star, Atlantic Star with clasp FRANCE AND GERMANY; Defence and War Medals (1939 -45), un named as issued, Royal Navy Long Service and Good Conduct Medal, impressed named k.61277. J.F. KEEFE. STO.1. H.M.S. OSPREY. Court mounted for display and comes with copies of service records and newspaper articles. Est: \$200 to \$250

John Francis Keefe was born on 22/6/1900 at Homerton, London. A farm labourer by trade, he enlisted into the Royal Navy under a Special Service enlistment with the service #

SS118750, as a Stoker 2nd Class 24/6/1918. During WW1 he served on the H.M.S. Hamadryad, minesweeping from 9/10/1918 – 31/5/1919. Following the war, he served on a variety of H.M ship and shore bases. On 23/5/1923 he was given the new service # K61277. He continued to serve on and during WW2 he served on the H.M.S Highlander from 12/3/1940 – 29/9/1945 as a Stoker 1st Class.

The ship took part in the Norway campaign (came under air attack), evacuated the B.E.F. troops from St. Nazaire (Operation ARIAL), evacuated B.E.F. troops and refugees from St Jean de Luz. 30/10/1940 assisted in sinking of U.32 with H.M. Destroyer HARVESTER, S.S. Empress of Australia was torpedoed. Submarine sunk in position 55.37N 12.20W and some survivors were rescued. 18/3/1943 the ship joined convoy HX229, which was under heavy attack from U-Boat Packs and was missed by two salvoes of torpedoes from U441 and U608. July – August 1944 supporting Normand landing. Released from service on 1/8/1945, he died in Portsmouth in November 1991.

478. WW1 and WW2 Royal Navy medals to Petty Officer Thomas William Tipple, who served aboard H.M.S. Kildonan Castle, Hawkins and Afrikander. British War and Victory Medals, both impressed named J.46195. T.W. TIPPLE. A.B. R.N.; 1939 - 45 Star, Atlantic Star, Italy Star, War Medal (1939 – 45) unnamed as issued; Royal Navy Long Service Medal (G.V.), impressed named J.46195. T.W. TIPPLE. L.S. H.M.S. WILD SWAN. Court mounted for display, comes with copies of service records, picture and medal rolls. Est: \$200 to \$250

Petty Officer Thomas William Tipple was born on 16/5/1900 at Sandport, Portsmouth. He enlisted into the Royal Navy straight from school on 5/11/1915 as a Boy 2nd Class. He served in a variety of H.M. Ship and shore bases over his 30 years' service. He was promoted to Petty Officer 27/8/1933. Awarded his L.S. & G.C. Medal 1/10/1933. During WW2 he served on the H.M.S. Hawkins from 9/9/1938 – 1/10/1939 and Afrikander 21/12/1940 – 18/9/1941. His records no longer display ships served on after this date but note 'Pensioned' 15/5/1940 and released class 'A' 14/9/1945. He died in 1973 at Claro, Yorkshire.

479. WW2 Australian issued Aircrew Europe Star to Flight Lieutenant John Lyall Sayers D.F.C. and bar, who flew two operational tours flying Lancaster's, the first with 647 Squadron and the second with 617 (Dambusters) Squadron. He flew two strikes against the German battleship 'Tirpitz', including the raid which sank her and later attacked the 'Lutzow'. Aircrew Europe Star, impressed named 414844 J.L. SAYERS. Comes with copies of service papers, photographs and newspaper articles. Est: \$400 to \$500

Distinguished Flying Cross (London Gazette, 14/11/1944) citation: Flight Lieutenant Sayers has completed numerous operations against the enemy in the course of which he has invariably displayed the utmost fortitude and devotion to duty.

Bar to the D.F.C. (London Gazette, 4/12/1945) citation: Flight Lieutenant Sayers has completed a large number of operational sorties and since the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross has completed many more. He is a captain of outstanding ability who has participated in two attacks against the German battleship 'Tirpitz', including the successful one of November 1944, when she was sunk. He also attacked the battleship 'Lutzow' in April 1945, when the ship was severely damaged. During this attack his aircraft was hit repeatedly by enemy anti – aircraft fire, but undeterred he continued his bombing run. These instances are typical of the courage and fine fighting spirit displayed by Flight Lieutenant Sayers.

Flight Lieutenant John Lyall Sayers was born on 21/2/1921 in Brisbane Queensland, pre-war he was working as an engine cleaner for the Queensland Railways when he enlisted into the Royal Australian Air Force on 9/11/1941, mustering as Aircrew. Following training in Australia and Canada he qualified as a pilot, being stationed in England from 8/3/1943 to

21/2/1946. Promoted to Pilot Officer in November 1943 and Flight Lieutenant in November 1945.

He initially flew with 467 Squadron from 24/1/1944 to 1/9/1944 flying Lancaster's. His second tour was with 617 Squadron (Dam Busters) 1/9/1944 to 7/6/1945.

He flew in the famous 12th November 1944 raid against the Tirpitz, which resulted in her sinking after being hit by 2 tallboy bombs. He also flew in the raid against the Lutzow on 16/4/1945 when it was hit with a tallboy, causing it to settle on the shallow harbour bed. The successful strike on the Tirpitz was filmed and can be viewed on YouTube. He flew some 51 operational sorties with 960 operational air hours. Discharged in 24/5/1946, he died on 23/11/2007 in Brisbane.

480. WW2 Australian medals to Private Norman Eric Hutchinson, who served with 2/28th Battalion and 24th Infantry Anti-Tank Company at both Tobruk and El-Alamein and later saw service with the 1st Australian Parachute Battalion. A hard man who spent 155 days in the cells in the Middle East and Australia.

1939 -45 Star, Africa Star with 8th ARMY clasp, Pacific Star, 1939 - 45 War and Defence Medals and Australian Service Medal 1939 -45 (all 1970's style naming) WX6057 N.E. HUTCHINSON. Court mounted for display and comes with copy of his service record, photographs and newspaper articles. Est: \$400 to \$500

Norman Eric Hutchinson was born on 21/1/1919 in Bunbury Western Australia. A miner by trade he enlisted at Northam, WA on 13/7/1940, posted to 'D' Company 2/28th Battalion on 6/9/1940. He was a colourful character with numerous charges to his name, ranging from AWOL, disobeying a lawful command, resisting escort etc. He was charged in every theatre he served in, including a court martial in Australia, spending 155 days in the cells. He certainly saw some hard fighting, having embarked at Fremantle on 3/1/1941, landing in the Middle East on 2/2/1941. The battalion was in Tobruk when it was besieged in April 1941 and on the 5/5/41 he was transferred to the 24th Infantry Anti-Tank Company. The 24th served at Tobruk with distinction with a casualty list equal to more than 50% of their strength, they were heavily engaged over Easter, when the Germans launched a heavy armoured assault against the perimeter. They were withdrawn to Palestine to rebuild in September 1941. The remnants of the unit were absorbed into the 2/3rd Australian Anti-Tank Regiment on 16/10/1941. He was charged with breaking out of camp on 16/11/1941, receiving 14 days cells at No. 2 Australian Detention Barracks. He returned to the regiment only to go AWOL again two days later, receiving another 28 days detention.

Along with the regiment, he took part in the First Battle of El Alamein. Casualties throughout July amounted to 23 killed, 80 wounded and 46 captured. Later, during October and November, the regiment supported the offensive actions of the Second Battle of El Alamein, during which the 9th Division carried out attacks towards the coast, before the Allied breakthrough in early November. The 2/3rd Anti-Tank Regiment fired 1,276 rounds during 13 days of heavy fighting, during which 36 guns were destroyed. He returned to Australia with the unit on 19/2/1943, being posted to the 1st Australian Parachute Battalion after qualifying as a parachutist on 28/1/1944. His conduct sheet shows 10/2/1944 'Marched in Drunk', followed by AWOL 10 days later. The unit never deployed overseas and he subsequently transferred to H.Q. 3rd Australian Infantry Brigade on 19/7/1944, followed by the 2/16th Field Company in January 1945, serving in New Guinea from 12/4/1945 – 24/1/1946. He discharged on 7/2/1946 and died in Perth on 23/11/1977. His medals were stolen shortly before his death.

481. WW2 Royal Australian Navy medals to Able Seaman Keith Henry Johnston who served on H.M.A.S. Perth, Stuart and Napier seeing action at Malta, Greece, Crete, and Tobruk. 1939 -45 Star, Atlantic Star, Africa Star, Burma Star with clasp Pacific, Defence Medal, and Australian Service Medal 1939 -45, all named 22425 K.H. JOHNSTON. The

stars have pantograph style naming. Court mounted for display and comes with copy service records. Est \$300 to \$400

Able Seaman Keith Henry Johnston was born on 30/6/1921 in Brisbane, Queensland. A clerk by trade he enlisted into the Royal Australian Navy on 5/8/1938 as a 'boy', at age 18 he signed on for 12 years. During WW2 he served on H.M.A.S. Perth between 19/5/1939 – 15/7/1941. She was off the coast of Venezuela when World War II began and did not leave the area until March 1940. On returning to Australia, she was assigned to convoy escort duty and patrols along the Australian coast until November 1940, when she was sent to the Mediterranean, being heavily involved with the transportation of troops, supplies and evacuees between Greece and Crete. On 25 April the ship was assigned to help in the evacuation of Allied troops from Greece.

On 28 May, the ship was assigned to 'Force D', three cruisers, three destroyers and a troopship, which was sent to evacuate soldiers from Sphakia, a small port on the southern coast of Crete, Perth carried two small landing craft to ferry troops aboard. Beginning at 09:30 'Force D' was repeatedly attacked by German aircraft, with Perth suffering several near misses before being struck by a bomb which exploded in the forward boiler room with 4 of her sailors and 9 of the 1,188 embarked soldiers killed. The explosion temporarily knocked out her power and the cruiser came to a halt before it could be restored a half-hour later. The cruiser was able to reach Alexandria the next day and was under repair until 22 June. Perth sailed for Haifa, British Palestine, three days later to participate in the invasion of Vichy Syria and Lebanon.

He served aboard H.M.A.S. Stuart (destroyer) 16/7/1941 – 22/8/1941, part of the Tobruk Ferry Service running supplies to Tobruk. H.M.A.S. Napier (destroyer) 23/8/1941 – 27/11/1942 the Napier took part in the supplying of besieged Tobruk in. He served at Cerberus 24/11/1942 – 11/8/1943. His records become illegible after this point, but he served on the Maryborough (Bathurst-class corvette) 11/10/1943 – He demobilised on 10/5/1946 and was granted a pension.

482. WW2 British medals to Private J.W. Talbot Ox and Bucks Regiment, who were part of the 6th Airborne Division during WW2 and fought at Normandy, Ardennes and the Rhine crossing. Post war he served in campaigns including Palestine, Greece and Cyprus. 1939 – 45 Star, France and Germany Star, Defence and War Medals, all unnamed as issued, British General Service Medal (G.V.I.R.), with 2 clasps, PALESTINE 1945 – 48, CYPRUS. Impressed named 4459331 PTE. J.W. TALBOT. OXF. BUCKS. Court mounted for display, comes with copy medal roll. Est: \$300 to \$400

J.W. Talbot appears on the medal roll as serving in Palestine between May – August 1947. He served with the 2nd Battalion in Palestine and it is believed that he served with them in WW2. Both the 1st and 2nd Battalion fought in the Normandy campaign, the 1st landing on the 24th June and the 2nd landing on the 6th June. D Company in six Horsa gliders led by Major John Howard who captured the Caen canal and Orne River bridges. The remainder of the battalion landing via the beach on the 6th as well. The 2nd Ox and Bucks, along with the rest of the 6th Airborne Division, was withdrawn to the United Kingdom on 2/3 September to recuperate and reorganise, the 2nd Battalion lost over 50% of its strength in the campaign. The Ardennes offensive saw the battalion with the rest of the 6th Airborne Division being rushed back to Belgium to fight in the Battle of the Bulge and Battle of Bure. They were returned to England 28/2/1945.

They then engaged in the bitterly fought crossing the Rhine, with the 2nd Battalion once again involved in a glider borne air assault landing, known as Operation Varsity, which was the largest airborne operation in the history of warfare, followed by the airborne support for Operation Plunder (the Rhine Crossing in late March 1945). The battalion landed on the north-east perimeter of 6th Airborne Divisions' landing zone, the furthest east of any British

Army unit. The battalion suffered heavily as the Germans met the landing gliders with ferocious fire in the air and on the ground; the 2nd Ox and Bucks lost 400 killed or injured out of a total battalion strength of 800 men. At Hamminkeln the gliders flew into a barrage of anti-aircraft fire; there were 4 enemy anti-aircraft guns gun-pits positioned near Hamminkeln station. During the landing which took only 10 minutes to complete there was thick smoke and dust from the area of Wesel and many of the battalion's 30 gliders were on fire and there were many casualties.

Post war he served in Palestine, from October 1945 the 2nd Battalion, arrived in Palestine as Britain's Imperial Strategic Reserve in the Middle East. In March 1946 the battalion moved to Alamein camp in Jerusalem. On 26 April 1946 the battalion wore their red berets for the final time, at a farewell to the division parade. The battalion was stationed in Jerusalem when the King David Hotel bombing took place on 22 July 1946. In June 1949, the regiment moved to Greece during the civil war in that country. In October 1951, following a short period in Cyprus, the regiment deployed to the British-controlled Suez Canal Zone in Egypt. There, the regiment saw active service performing internal security duties.

483. WW2 medals to Private Thomas Goodfellow, who was serving with the 1st Battalion, The Black Watch during the fall of France in 1940. He was one of the few to escape when the battalion was captured at St Valery. He returned to fight in Normandy, being wounded on 19th July 1944 at Le Pont de Juvigny.

Thomas W Goodfellow from Pontypool, Monmouthshire, Wales, is believed to have initially enlisted in the Durham Light Infantry and was posted to the 1st Battalion (Tyneside Scottish) Black Watch on 1/2/1940 to serve in France as part of the 51st Highland Division. The battalion was involved in heavy fighting during the fall of France and went into captivity with the rest of the Division at St Valery on 12/6/1940. Some 30 men managed to escape to England and a new 1st Battalion was formed around them. The 1st Battalion landed in Normandy on 12/6/1944. He was wounded in action on 19/7/1944 at Le Pont de Juvigny when: 'The Battalion moved forward and by 10:15 hours was in the new position, digging in. The move forward was unopposed although two men in 'B' Company were wounded by a Spandau sniping team. The Germans withdrew when fire was returned'. He survived the war being released to class 'Z' (Army Reserve) 7/6/1946 and was awarded the Efficiency medal in 1946.

484. WW2 P.O.W. medal group to Private Horace Henry Frederick Roser, 1st Battalion Hampshire Regiment who was captured by the 1st Fallschirm-Panzer Division 'Hermann Göring' in Sicily, in July 1943. He survived the war to serve as a Warrant Officer with the R.A.S.C. in Malaya, Cyprus and later the Army Cadets. 1939 - 45 Star, Africa Star, Italy Star, War Medal (1939 -45) all unnamed as issued; General Service Medal ((E.II.R), with two clasps CYPRUS, MALAYA. Army Long Service and Good conduct Medal with bar REGULAR ARMY (E.II.R), both impressed named T/22784709 W.O. CL. 2. H.H.F. ROSER. R.A.S.C.; Cadet Forces Medal (E.II.R), impressed named CAPT. H.H.F. ROSER. Court mounted for display and comes with copies of P.O.W. lists, extracts from the Royal Hampshire Regiment Journal and London Gazette. Est: \$300 to \$400

Captain Horace Henry Frederick Roser was born on 24/9/1920 in Horsham, Sussex. During WW2 he was serving as a Private with 'D' Company, 1st Battalion Hampshire Regiment (service # 6399731). The battalion was deployed on Garrison duties in El Daba, Egypt at the beginning of the war. It moved to Palestine on peace keeping duties in December 1939 and then moved to Moascar in Egypt, then to Mearsa Matruh in Summer

1940. One of its duties was to look after the large number of Italian prisoners after the fall of Sidi Barrani. In February 1941, the battalion arrived in Malta, where it became part of the 1st (Malta) Infantry Brigade (with 1st Dorset Regiment and 2nd Devonshire Regiment). This later became the 231st Infantry Brigade. Duties in Malta included airfield repair and working as stevedores in the docks. In April 1943, the 231st Brigade, was moved to Alexandria, then subsequently to Cairo and Suez, where it trained as an independent assault brigade.

The battalion landed at Sicily on the evening of 9th July and quickly established a bridgehead near the village of Marsamemi on the Pachino Peninsula. At 6.30am the battalion marched off, passing through the village of Noto where they were enthusiastically welcomed by the civilians. For the first two days, the Brigade's advance was surprisingly easy. The 1st Hampshire led the crossing of the Dittaino and launched surprise midnight attacks on two hills overlooking the river. 'A' and 'D' Companies then passed through, crossed the river at several points and captured two other hills about half a mile beyond in what was a textbook operation. At a cost of a few wounded, the 1st Hampshire killed many Italians and took 20 officers and 864 other ranks prisoner.

After the Dittaino the first really serious opposition was encountered at Agira – which was held by Italians, strongly reinforced by Germans of the Hermann Goering Division and the 29th Panzer Grenadier Regiment. On the night of 25th July, the 1st Hampshire were sent forward, with orders to hold a hill called the Pyramid and another prominent feature called Campanelli, while the Canadians attacked again. Unfortunately, the Canadians were unsuccessful once more, leaving the Hampshire in exposed and extended positions which they were ordered to hold.

Around 4pm the Germans attacked 'A' and 'B' Companies on the Campanelli. In the very fierce close fighting – against crack units of the Hermann Goering Division and SS Paratroopers – 'B' Company suffered heavy casualties before being forced from the top of the hill. The 1st Hampshire continued to resist but, unable to call up artillery support and with their positions coming under fire from Agira, they finally abandoned the Campanelli and took up new positions at the Pyramids. The Battalion continued to hold its positions here under almost constant shelling and drove off many counterattacks. On the evening of 26th July German troops supported by tanks mounted a heavy attack on 'D' Company south of the Agira Road. It was not until 29th July that Agira was finally taken but most of the Germans had got away. The 1st Hampshire, however, had carried the difficult task of harassing the Germans in their rear although by the end of the operation the battalion had been reduced to the strength of three rifle companies. The 1st Battalion suffered 18 officers and 286 other ranks killed or wounded in action in Sicily.

Roser was initially reported as 'missing' but later confirmed as P.O.W. captured on 26/7/1943. He was imprisoned at Stalag XVIII-A located at Wolfsberg Austria. He was lucky to survive as on 18/12/1944 the camp was bombed by U.S. aircraft. Forty-six prisoners and several guards were killed. Both the British and French camp hospitals were hit, with the British hut being almost completely destroyed. On the approach of Allied forces in April 1945 all fit prisoners from the camps and neighbouring labour units were marched east to Stalag XVIII-C, the camp was liberated by elements of the British 8th Army on 11/5/1945. Post war he remained in the Army transferring to the Royal Army Service Corps in January 1946, serving in Malaya and Cyprus. He was awarded the LS & GC Medal on 17/10/1957 He later served 18 years as a Cadet Administrative Assistant for the Gosport Area. He died on 6/10/1980 in Hampshire.

[BEM]: LG 5/6/1952, p3058; CAG 19/6/1952, p2832, to 1921 Sergeant Raymond Deed. Citation: Integrity & devotion in training reinforcements.

Recommendation: Sergeant Deed returned to Japan from Korea on 25 June 1951 after serving during the bitter winter campaigns. Quite frequently whilst in Korea this NCO commanded a platoon with distinction. On his return he elected to stay in Japan to train reinforcements for the battalion, although he was given the option of returning to his home in Australia. Sergeant Deed was aware of the urgent need for trained reinforcements...During the period of the October campaign, when Third Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment was in desperate need of reinforcements, Sergeant Deed worked continuously without rest for five weeks and to his credit must be attributed much of the credit that it was possible to send enough well-trained reinforcements forward to bring the battalion to full strength within a few weeks.

Warrant Officer Class 1 Raymond Deed was born on Anzac Day 1927 in Kingaroy, Queensland. He was working as a truck driver's offsider when he enlisted into the Australian Army on 16/3/1946, given the service # QX500456, later renumbered 1921. After initial Infantry training, he was posted to Japan on 2/12/1946 as part of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force (B.C.O.F.) with the 3rd Battalion Royal Australian Regiment, 34th Brigade. Promoted to Corporal 27/8/47. He landed in Korea with the battalion as a Sergeant, serving from 28/9/1950 to 25/6/1951 fighting during the advance and retreat and was present at Kapyong on his 24th birthday and survived the famous battle there, where Australian and allied forces held back thousands of invading Chinese troops. He was posted back to Japan on 16/7/1951 to the 1st Reinforcement Holding unit and was awarded a well-earned British Empire Medal for his efforts in Korea and upon return to Australia, he was promoted to W.O.1 18/10/66. He deployed to South Vietnam to serve as the R.S.M. of the A.A.T.V. from 25/6/1970 to 23/6/1971, being awarded a Mention in Despatches for his efforts in reorganising and reconstructing defensive compounds as well as leadership and drive. On returning to Australia, he served in several postings as R.S.M. until discharging on 1/7/1977 and died on 5/10/2009 in Semaphore, South Australia.

He is also entitled to the Australian Service Medal 1939 – 45 with clasp Japan, Korea Medal, U.N. Medal Korea, Australian Active Service Medal clasp Korea and Vietnam Defence

Service Medal, Republic of Vietnam Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Long Service and Good Conduct Medal, U.S. Presidential Unit Citation, South Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm unit citation.

489. Queen Elizabeth II 1953 Coronation Medal, unnamed as issued, with accompanying award document dated 2nd June 1953 to Sir James Thyne Henderson C.M.G. Est: \$150 to \$200

Sir James Thyne Henderson C.M.G. was born on 18/1/1901 in Hawick, Scotland, he was educated at Sedburgh School, then Queen's College, Oxford, where he read history and rowed for the College before joining the diplomatic service in 1925. Initially stationed in Athens, then Helsinki in 1932, he was sent in 1938 to Japan as first secretary and had to flee from there on the outbreak of war with Japan. After the war he served in Stockholm and then Houston, Texas, where he was Consul-General. He was minister and head of mission in Iceland 1953-56. Then he moved to La Paz as ambassador to Bolivia in 1956. He was knighted in 1959 and retired the following year. Recalled by the Foreign Office to serve on attachment to the British delegation at the United Nations. After two years in New York, he returned to live in Scotland where he worked for the Scottish Council for Development and Industry. He also became involved with the Thistle Group, helping to promote Scottish exports by leading parties of businessmen to Scandinavia and Germany. He served as Chairman in Scotland of the Commonwealth Institute, and he was an elder in the North Morningside (Edinburgh) Church of Scotland. Died 26/8/1993 in Scotland. *His father's medals and awards are also listed for sale in this auction.

490. Miniature medal group consisting of C.M.G., King George VI Coronation Medal, Queen Elizabeth II Coronation Medal. Est: \$100 to \$150. Attributed to Sir James Thyne Henderson C.M.G.

491. WW2 Australian Army miniature medals, attributed to QX5634 Corporal native Ford McLachlan, 2/15th Battalion, who famously won his Distinguished Conduct Medal as part of Operation Bulimba, the painting of this courageous action being a long-time exhibit at the Australian War Memorial. G.V.I.R. Distinguished Conduct Medal, 1939-45 Star, The Africa Star, The Defence Medal, War Medal & Australian Service Medal 1939-45. Swing mounted as worn. This set was retained by JB Military Antiques when his full-size medals, uniforms and associated items were sold in 2015, the entire collection having been sold to JB Military Antiques direct from the family. The D.C.M. citation: During an attack carried out by an Aust. Inf. Bn. on enemy positions, near TEL EL EISA on 1 Sep 42, Cpl. McLachlan showed great courage, dash and leadership. McLachlan, who was in command of the rear section of his platoon, was ordered to attack an enemy post which was firing at his platoon from the right. Leading his section into the attack he bayoneted three enemy and subdued the post. He then took a Thompson sub-machine gun from a wounded man in his section, and led a further attack, in the face of Spandau fire, on another post 100 yds ahead which was enfilading his company. With his section he cleared out this position himself killing the enemy machine gunner and three others with his machine gun. Moving forward with the only two of his men left, McLachlan, assisted by covering fire from the right, assaulted another enemy post 200 yds ahead, throwing two grenades, which killed four enemy. Having by this time exhausted all his ammunition, he threatened four enemy (the crew of a Spandau) with his sub-machine gun used as a club. One of these men seized McLachlan by the right leg, but McLachlan got free by kicking him in the face, at the same time calling on one of his section to throw a grenade into the pit, which disposed of the four men in it. The determination and fighting spirit of the NCO were largely responsible for enabling his company to get on to its objective.

Andrew J. Robinson served with the Royal Dragoons and first saw active duty with 'A' Squadron in Bosnia in 1998 as part of 4th Armoured Brigade. This unit was redeployed to Macedonia in February 1999 for operation AGRICOLA 1 and later moved to Kosovo on 12 June 1999. They were finally relieved in August of that year and Robinson was not to see active service again for several years. Still with 'A' Squadron in October 2004 Robinson was deployed to Iraq, where he served from October 2004-May 2005, alongside the 1st Battalion, Welsh Guards to secure the border with Iran. Their role here was one of raids and arrests on high profile targets as well as ensuring the security of important facilities. Their campaign medals were awarded in Munster, Germany personally by the Prince of Wales, now HM The King; sold together with copied research including extracts from the Regimental Journal and details of their deployments as well as a nametag and three shoulder flashes.

Original Cotton Museum labels are attached to the back of the frame. The 84th Regiment formed part of VI Corps and at Waterloo took part in the action around Placenoit. Est: \$1500 to \$1800

Edward Cotton served as a Trooper in the British 7th Hussars during the Napoleonic Wars, including the Battle of Waterloo, where his horse was shot out from under him. After retiring from the army with the rank of Sgt Major, Cotton lived in the village of Mont-Saint-Jean where he gained a reputation as a battlefield guide and opened a museum, and hotel. In addition, in 1846 he published the first edition of his story of the Battle of Waterloo, titled 'A Voice from Waterloo'. Cotton died on 24/6/1849 with the museum and hotel continuing to be operated by his family until the early 1900s, when the contents of the museum were sold off at auction. This particular frame was more recently displayed at the private Waterloo Museum in Broadstairs, Kent, England, by Derek Saunders from 1991 until its closure in 1999.

513. Napoleonic Wars era Battle of Waterloo charger's hoof 'William' – 6th Inniskilling Dragoons – Lt. Alexander Hassard. Horse hoof with silver metal plaque naming it as belonging to 'William' the mount of Lieutenant (later Captain) Alexander Hassard of the 6th (Inniskilling) Dragoons on the day of the Battle of Waterloo, fought on 18th June 1815. Est: \$1400 to 1600

Lieutenant Alexander Hassard was born in about 1786, in County Cavan Ireland, formerly a Lieutenant of the 92nd Regiment. Alexander purchased a commission as a Cornet with the 6th Dragoons in 1810, being promoted to the rank of Lieutenant in 1813. The 6th Dragoons were mobilised to join the fight against Napoleon's forces in May 1815. The Regiment formed part of the Union Brigade of Heavy Cavalry, alongside the 1st Dragoons (Royals) and 2nd Dragoons (Scots Greys), under the command of fellow Irishman, Major-General William Ponsonby.

On 18/6/1815 the Union Brigade took part in the Battle of Waterloo, where at 2.00pm they were ordered to charge the massive assault of French forces, which was bearing down on the allied line. The Union Brigade smashed into the French infantry and then into the artillery, however the charge was carried too far with the 6th Dragoons being attacked by fresh French cavalry, suffering heavy casualties of 193 out of 400, plus 190 horses killed, with General Ponsonby also being killed at this time.

Lieutenant Hassard was severely wounded during the charge, being pierced by a Polish lance and took no part in any further action. He recovered from his wounds and continued to serve with the 6th Dragoons, being promoted to the rank of Captain in 1820. He went on to serve until 1825, receiving the Waterloo Medal for his service. He died in 1845. His mount at Waterloo, William, also survived and was reunited with Alexander, finally being put down in 1824. This lot comes with a quantity of research material.

514. 1857 French St Helena Medal framed with its rare, early numbered award certificate. An original St Helena Medal (50 x 31mm) and ribbon with a very nice patina, in a period glazed frame (26 x 35cm), together with its original award certificate, named to Garoscio Augustin of San Remo, with a low certificate number of 2692. This medal was

awarded to all those who “fought for the glory and independence of France” between 1792 and 1815 and were still living in 1857. Recipients were French or those from many other European nations who joined the Grand Armee. This item was acquired in Monaco, only some 30km from San Remo. Est: \$250 to \$300

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(b) The auctioneer will commence and advance the bidding in such increments as (s)he considers appropriate and is entitled to place bids on the Seller's behalf up to the Reserve Price for the lot, where applicable.

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8. Payment and Collection

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- (a) Charge the listed credit card details supplied for payment & store the lot at its premises or elsewhere at the Buyer's sole risk and expense;
- (b) Cancel the sale of the lot;
- (c) Set off any amounts owed to the Buyer by JB Military Antiques against any amounts owed to JB Military Antiques by the Buyer for the lot;
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- (b) By agreeing to these Conditions of Sale, the Bidder agrees to the processing of their personal information and to the disclosure of such information to third parties world-wide for the purposes outlined in Condition 11(a) and to Sellers as per Condition 9.

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- (c) The materials listed in Condition 1(a) set out the entire agreement between the parties.
- (d) If any part of these Conditions of Sale be held unenforceable, the remaining parts shall remain in full force and effect.
- (e) These Conditions of Sale shall be interpreted in accordance with Australian Law, under the exclusive jurisdiction of the Australian Courts, in favour of JB Military Antiques.

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
